

ACT TO SLASH U. S. COSTS TO REVENUE LEVEL

Senate Democrats Reach Pact After 'Taxpayers' Filibuster' Opens.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—Senate Democrats agreed today to attempt reduction of federal expenditures to the \$2,949,000,000 which is estimated to represent the government's probable revenues in the next fiscal year.

The Democratic agreement was reached in caucus after Senator Millard E. Tydings (Dem., Md.) instituted his "taxpayers' filibuster" against federal expenditures.

The Democratic conference did not undertake to make all the cuts at the present short session.

\$35 IS BOOTY IN TWO GROCERY HOLDUPS

Standard Stores Are Stuck Up by Negroes; Get \$28 at One.

Loot of about \$35 was obtained in two grocery holdups late Thursday afternoon as Negro bandits held customers and employees at bay.

Two Negroes entered a Standard grocery at 864 Indiana avenue and took \$28.39 from the cash register, Edgar Terhune, 55, of 1150 North Warman avenue, manager, reported to police.

After rifling the cash register, the bandits backed through a door and fled down an alley. In the store, besides Terhune, were Malcolm Terhune, 20, of the Warman avenue address, and a woman customer.

As the store was being closed for the night, Randolph Ford, 3902 Leonard street, manager of a Standard store at 702 East New York street, was held up by a Negro bandit. The man fled through an alley with between \$5 and \$8, Ford told police.

Cobs Profit

Worth More Than Corn, Kansas Farmer Learns in Marketing.

HIAWATHA, Kan., Jan. 27.—Farmers near here have discovered a load of ear corn is not worth as much as a load of cobs without the corn.

A farmer explained:

"First I buy a load of corn—I can get it from 10 cents to 20 cents a bushel, perhaps cheaper if I haul it myself.

"I shell the corn, which I use for feed. Then I take the cobs to town, selling them at \$3 a load.

"I get back the price of my corn with the money I obtain from selling the cobs. This leaves the corn with me for profit."

300 JOBLESS IN CHICAGO RIOT AT AID STATION

Negroes and Whites Stage Demonstration; Three Policemen Hurt.

CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—Rioting broke out shortly after noon today at a south side relief station in the black belt.

Three hundred unemployed, Negro and white, participated. First reports said three policemen, including a captain and a lieutenant, were hurt when they broke up a demonstration.
