

AUTO SHOW TO BE CONTINUED

Two Additional Days Are Added to Exhibit at Fairground.

Instead of closing tonight as planned, the local automobile show will continue until 10:30 Sunday night, officials of the Indianapolis Auto Trade Association announced today after a meeting Thursday night.

Numerous inquiries from local motorists and requests from out-of-town dealers, kept from attending the show because of the severe cold, led to the decision to add two additional days to the exhibit.

With an extra week-end added, show officials expect that attendance during Saturday and Sunday will be unusually heavy as motor fans take advantage of the delay in the closing.

The twenty-lap pushmobile race scheduled for 8:30 tonight is expected to draw a capacity crowd.

Governor Paul V. McNutt will referee the race.

Fifteen miniature race cars are expected to line up for the start, and the gun will be fired by Billy Arnold, 1930 Speedway victor.

The track had been laid out on the upper level of the show floor with room available for spectators. Persons driving autos to the show may travel north on Meridian street to Thirty-eighth and east on Thirty-eighth street to the fairground. Trans marked "Fairground" on the Illinois, Central and College lines go to the show.

DEATH CLAIMS EDWARD REMY

Former State Official Taken After Illness of Five Years.

After an illness of five years, Edward A. Remy, 71, of 945 Middle drive, Woodruff Place, brother of Charles F. Remy, former Indiana appellate court judge, died today at his home.

He was active in politics until stricken with paralysis five years ago. At various times, beginning in 1917, he served as deputy secretary of state, deputy state auditor and as a member of the board of accounts.

Born near Hope (Ind.), he was graduated from Franklin college in 1887 and began teaching in Johnson county schools, later becoming superintendent of schools in Tipton. In 1896 he purchased an interest in the Seymour Republican and was its editor for many years. He was elected president of the Indiana Editorial Association in 1908, and two

years later was appointed postmaster at Seymour.

Disposing of his interest in the Republican, he later bought into the Greensburg News. In 1933 he married Lucy Edwards, who died in 1925. He is survived by his brother, and two daughters, Miss Margaret Remy, a teacher at Technical high school, and Mrs. Elizabeth Sheard of Oxford, O. Funeral arrangements have not been made.

LUESSE TO BE FREE IN MONTH

McNutt Approves Proposal to Cancel Fine: to Be Out March 14.

Governor Paul V. McNutt today approved the recommendation to cancel the fine of Theodore Luesse, unemployed leader, who was sentenced to a year at the Indiana state farm and fined \$500 by Judge Frank Baker of criminal court.

Farm trustees recommended that \$150 of the fine be cancelled and Luesse freed by March 14.

As a leader of the unemployed, Luesse was sentenced for making inflammatory speeches opposing an eviction.

In addition to serving his time, he has been serving his fine at the rate of \$1 a day. Additional time also

has been given him for breaking institution rules.

The Governor has been notified that a demonstration of the unemployed will be held on the state-house steps next Tuesday. One of the requests to be made is to free Luesse, whom they term a political prisoner.
