

# CONDITION OF CHICAGO CHIEF STILL CRITICAL

Apparently Crazy Gunman Stands on Chair to Fire at Roosevelt.

Railway yards, where his special train was waiting.

As soon as he learned that Cermak's injuries were critical, however, Mr. Roosevelt cancelled his plans to leave for the north, and returned to the hospital.

"I'm glad it was me, not you," Mayor Cermak told Mr. Roosevelt. "I wish you would be more careful. The country needs you badly. You shouldn't take any more such chances as you took tonight."

Mr. Roosevelt expressed his sorrow over the mayor's injury. He promised to see him again in the morning. Then he returned to the Astor yacht, where friends said he showed no nervousness over the attack.

First Thought for President

Mystery surrounded the supposed absence of Cermak's usual bodyguard. The mayor had been seen on the bandstand in front of the concrete "shell" that acts as a sounding board for speakers in the park. Mr. Roosevelt had waved to him and indicated his desire to speak to him.

Cermak made his way to the President-elect's car, apparently without guards, and stood on the running board while Mr. Roosevelt was speaking. He had extended his hand in congratulation when the shots rang out, and he fell to the ground.

Mayor Cermak's first thought as he fell to the ground after the attack of the would-be assassin, was for President-Elect Roosevelt, eye-witnesses revealed.

"The President," he gasped, "Get him away!"

Crowd Advances on Jail

A second after the shots had ripped through the air, the car in which Mr. Roosevelt was riding, and on which Cermak had been standing, leaped forward to carry the President-elect to safety.

Mr. Roosevelt, after quick realization of what had happened, commanded the driver to stop.

Secret service men and L. L. Lee, city manager of Miami, raised Cermak from the ground and placed him on the seat next to the President-elect. Mr. Roosevelt helped support the wounded man as orders were given to rush him to the Jackson memorial hospital.

In the park, knots of people stood telling each other how the attack had occurred. Several hundred of the Roosevelt audience had left to advance on the building which houses Miami's jail.

Extra police guards were put on duty to keep the crowd away from the building's entrances, though there was little danger that the crowd could reach Zangara. The jail is on the twenty-seventh floor of the building.

Inside, detectives were drawing from the Italian bricklayer a story of hatred of all kings and presidents, and of all the rich and powerful; a story, as well, of "stomach" which he indicated had driven him to desire to kill Mr. Roosevelt.

He told how he had bought the pistol he used only a few hours before the attack. He had been here for two months, hoping his stomach would improve, but it had not grown better, police quoted him as saying.

Early today Valerio Zangara's roommate was picked up on a charge of suspicion of being an accomplice. Police had not filed a formal charge against Zangara.

I had just entered the United Press offices when I heard a shout that five shots had been fired at Mr. Roosevelt. In an instant, some one was hustling me off in a taxicab to the Roosevelt home.

I arrived to find Mrs. Roosevelt and her daughter, Mrs. Curtis Dall, just returning from an early evening engagement.

Receives News Calmly

An agitated Negro butler opened the door.

"What's it all about?" asked Mrs. Roosevelt quickly.

The butler told her that there were reports that Mr. Roosevelt had been fired upon, but had escaped injury.

Mrs. Roosevelt received the news calmly.

"These things are to be expected," she said.

A few moments later she was called to the telephone. It was Mr. Roosevelt, calling from the hospital where he had gone to see Mayor Anton J. Cermak of Chicago.

"How Are You, Honey?"

"How are you, honey?" asked Mrs. Roosevelt.

There was a quick conversation. Then Mrs. Roosevelt turned to those in the room and said:

"He's all right. He's not the least bit excited."

After talking with her husband, Mrs. Roosevelt quickly telephoned

# HEAVIER GUARD ORDERED FOR HIGH OFFICIALS

'Dastardly Act,' Hoover's Statement on Attack Upon Roosevelt.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—The secret service today redoubled its protection of President Herbert Hoover and President-Elect Franklin D. Roosevelt, while the nation's highest officials expressed thankfulness that Mr. Roosevelt had escaped a gunman's bullets in Miami.

Senator J. Hamilton Lewis of Illinois suggested that elaborate outdoor inauguration ceremonies on March 4 be canceled so Mr. Roosevelt's appearances before crowds could be made as brief as possible.

"Dastardly," Says Hoover

Rear Admiral Cary T. Grayson, chairman of the inaugural committee, said, however, that there would be no change in arrangements for elaborate outdoor ceremonies during which Mr. Roosevelt would face crowds of many thousands.

President Hoover issued a statement denouncing the attempted attack as a "dastardly act" and rejecting over the safety of the man to whom he will surrender the country's highest office in just sixteen days.

Mr. Hoover had retired when first word of the shooting was flashed to the White House by the United Press. He was aroused at once.

After receiving details he issued the following statement:

"I am deeply shocked at the news. It is a dastardly act."

White-haired Richard J. Jervis, veteran secret service officer in charge of White House detail, immediately strengthened the guard of operatives at the mansion.

Guards Are Strengthened

The detail of policemen who patrol the White House grounds was augmented.

The big iron gates remained closed, however, and all was quiet through the night.

Additional guards also were assigned to Vice-President Clarence Curtis and Vice-President-Elect John N. Garner.

"Extreme care must be taken to protect Mr. Roosevelt," said Senator Lewis, an intimate friend of the gravely wounded Cermak.

"The open-air inauguration ceremonies make the President-Elect a target. The services should be held in the house of representatives."

# Assassin's Deed Would Make Garner President

Method of Succession Is Provided by 'Lame Duck' Amendment Recently Made U. S. Law.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—If the bullets aimed at President-Elect Franklin D. Roosevelt had found their mark Speaker John W. Garner the Vice-President-elect, would have succeeded to the presidency.

This method of succession was included in the Norris "lame duck" constitutional amendment adopted recently by the states.

Prior to that time no provision was made in the Constitution or the law to cover such cases.

There also was no precedent for the succession as at no time in the country's history has a President-Elect died before taking office.

While the main provisions of the Norris resolution became effective only on Oct. 15, this provision was made effective immediately on ratification of the amendment.

SHOOTING NEWS IS HELD BACK

Cermak's Granddaughter, at School Here, Unaware of Tragedy.

While Miss Vivien Graham is making arrangements for a tea this afternoon at Ladywood school, on the Millersville road, she is unaware her grandfather, Mayor Anton J. Cermak, Chicago, is in a critical condition in a Miami (Fla.) hospital.

Cermak was wounded Wednesday night in attempted assassination of President-Elect Franklin D. Roosevelt.

No word has been sent to her regarding the injury, and officials of the school have kept the news from her.

"Miss Graham and her grandfather are very devoted," said the Mother Superior, "and we are keeping the tragic news from her as long as possible."

Miss Graham is prominent in dramatic, athletic and social activities of the school.

PASS TREASURY BILL
