

SENATE VOTES TODAY ON HELP FOR DESTITUTE

average of \$4.25 a week for a family of four.

A total of 931 cities answered a query as to whether they can care for all who need relief at present. Of these, 685 said they can not. Almost all anticipate heavy increases in the number needing help.

In regard to private relief, it was found that private agencies are carrying 49 per cent of the burden in 321 cities, 99 per cent of it in 169 cities and 100 per cent in 71 cities. In 183 cities little or nothing was being done by private charity.

Quick disposal of the relief bill by the senate, working under limitation of debate, is part of a last-minute effort to dispose of as much legislation as possible before the lame-duck session of congress ends.

Democrats Smooth Pass

Democrats anxious to smooth the path as far as possible for the special session, and lame ducks, anxious to accomplish as much as possible before they leave office, are co-operating in this effort.

The senate will agree to consider bankruptcy legislation after relief, according to present plans, laying the bankruptcy bill aside to consider the independent offices appropriations bill late today or on Tuesday.

The next major controversy in the senate, therefore, will concern appropriation of funds for the federal trade commission.

Move to Save Trade Commission

Senator Joseph T. Robinson, Democratic floor leader, has served notice that he will move to give the trade commission \$1,101,500 for 1934, an amount only \$8,000 below the budget recommendation.

Defeat of his amendment would mean the abandonment of the economic division of the commission, only government fact-finding agency, unless the new administration saves it with a deficiency appropriation next year. The house cut the commission funds 65 per cent leaving it only \$510,000 for the year, and the senate appropriations committee added to this only \$288,000 to finish the utility investigation.

The bankruptcy bill on which the senate will vote is very different from that passed by the house.

Change Bankruptcy Bill

It omits all provisions for reorganization of railroads and other corporations providing only for individual debtors able to secure consent of a majority of their creditors to a scaling down or postponement of their debts.

It does not include the provision adopted by the house giving federal judges power to grant extensions of time on farm and other mortgages whether creditors agree or not.

Debate so far on the relief bill has concerned itself principally with the extent to which construction loans from the R. F. C. shall be extended and liberalized.

C. M. T. C. Plan Doomed



An attempt by Senator Henrik Shipstead (P. L. Minn.) to make it possible for hospitals to borrow for operating expenses was pending when the senate met today.

Both La Follette-Costigan and Wagner relief plans provide that \$15,000,000 may be turned over to the states as a grant to spend for relief of transient workers.

If such provision becomes law, it probably will put an end to the \$22,000,000 appropriation for enrolling 88,000 boys in the C. M. T. C., which the senate tacked onto the army appropriation bill.

LET THE DEAR PEOPLE RULE, WATSON SAYS

Up to Indiana to Vote Its
Will on Liquor, Asserts
Lame Duck Senator.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Senator Jim Watson is in favor of letting the people rule.

He says as much in a formal statement which he issued explaining his vote in favor of the resolution submitting the eighteenth amendment to the states for repeal.

The veteran lame duck, who will step down from his seat in the senate March 4, recently has shown an extraordinary proclivity for statement-making, so much so that Washington observers are wondering whether Senator Jim is not laying plans for a political comeback two years hence.

The Watson why-I-voted-for-repeal statement, about 1,000 words in length, calls attention to the repeal planks in the Democratic state and national platforms and the 200,000 Democratic majority cast in Indiana last November.

"It now is up to the people of Indiana to determine what they want done. I believe in submitting the matter to their will and wish and so voted. I believe that it is up to them to determine their policy on this question in the future and, if they want Indiana to remain ostensibly dry, legally dry, they can say so by election of delegates to the convention for which we have provided.

6 LEGISLATORS CONSIDER PLEA OF RUTH JUDD

Public Hearing.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Feb. 20.—Six Arizona state legislators today con-

sidered the plea of Winnie Ruth Judd, condemned murderer, that they aid her in her fight to escape hanging.

The committee, appointed by the state legislature, heard Mrs. Judd's story of the killings of Agnes Ann Lerol and Hedwig Samuelson, her friends, at the Florence state pris-
