

M'NUITT PLANS REVAMPING OF STATE OFFICES

Greater Efficiency Is Goal: May Put Farm Board at Fairground.

Plans for revamping state offices in the interest of greater efficiency and service to the public are being worked out by administration forces, according to Governor Paul V. McNutt.

Shifts will be made to consolidate various activities of the eight major departments created under the reorganization plan.

These departments are the executive, state, audit and control, treasury, law, education, public works, commerce and industry.

Under the treasury department, all tax collection agencies are to be concentrated and the Governor expects to have them grouped, perhaps on the first floor of the statehouse.

Among the plans being given consideration is one to move the state board of agriculture offices out to the state fairground, McNutt said.

This would mean the shifting of E. J. Barker, board of agriculture secretary, and his staff of assistants.

"The fairground buildings represent one of the largest plant investments made by the state," McNutt pointed out. "I see no reason why one of the buildings should not be heated and used for the board offices, since we are in need of the space in the statehouse."

Lieutenant Governor M. Clifford Townsend will continue to occupy his office in the senate for his full time duties under the present plan.

Offices of Adjutant-General Elmer F. Straub would be shifted to the board of agriculture offices on the first floor and the executive department, with its pardon and parole and poor relief divisions, would be expanded to include the present military offices.


Mr. Raborn has been conducting Bible study classes each night this week from 7 to 7:30, followed by services.
