

# STATE HEALTH SERVICE TO BE REORGANIZED

### McNutt Mapping Complete Change of Department and Personnel.

Complete change of personnel and reorganization of the state health department is the next state departmental step to be taken by Governor Paul V. McNutt, it was announced today.

The plan includes abolition of the present state health board and reorganization of Dr. William F. King, state health department director, and Dr. Ada Sweetzer, head of the child health department.

Announcement of King's successor will be made shortly, the Governor said.

Laboratory, welfare and health instruction work of the department will be transferred to the Indiana university school of medicine and the anti-rabies treatments will be administered in the out-patient department of Robert Long hospital.

A saving of \$75,000 annually in department expense is predicted by the administration.

All divisions of the department exercising police powers will remain in the statehouse annex under the new director. These include the divisions of nursing, housing, water and sewage control, food and drug administration and milk control.

State police will be trained and used as sanitary inspectors, the Governor said.

President William Lowe Bryan of the state university has approved the plan.

## DRY HOTEL TO CLOSE WITH BEER'S RETURN

### Michigan Hostelry Flourished for Years on Temperance Plan.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., April 7.—The old Eagle hotel, an inn without a bar that flourished in pre-prohibition days, has finally closed its doors after fifty years of prosperity.

Deacon James K. Johnston announced in 1883 that he would erect a hotel, run on a strictly temperance plan. Against the advice of friends who told him it couldn't be done, he built the Eagle hotel.

Despite its aridity, the hostelry enjoyed wide favor among transients, traveling men, and even townfolk. Johnston's three sons, who assumed management of the property in 1931, decided re-opening that further operation was unwise.

## INDIANA HISTORICAL COUNCIL IS FORMED

Bailey, state library director; Luther L. Dickerson, Indianapolis city librarian; Professor R. Clyde White, director of the bureau of social research division, and Miss Estella Wolf, reference librarian of Indiana university.

## JOBLESS PLAY ROLE OF MODERN PIONEERS

### City Dwellers Settle in Homestead Land to Stave Off Hunger.

TURNER, Mich., April 7.—The depression has no fears for a group of modern pioneers, who have gone back to the soil for sustenance and shelter near here.

The group, numbering about twenty, are mostly former city dwellers who have been unable to find regular employment. Undaunted, they migrated to the rough and simple country of eastern Michigan. Then, much as the people of 49, they staked out homesteads. After three years' residence, they receive a deed from the state and the land is theirs.

The majority of them live in home-made cabins, built at a cost

of less than \$100. Most of them average from \$10 to \$20, excluding the simple furnishings. Cordwood is used for fuel and should the supply run low there are many acres of timber that are theirs for the taking.
