

**PASTORS ALONE
IN DRY FIGHT,
MEETING TOLD**

'We Wage Battle Without
Congregations' Support,
Says M. E. Minister.

"We wage this fight without
support of much of our congrega-
tions. They have swallowed this
wet propaganda hook, line and
sinker."

With this assertion, the Rev. Wil-
liam E. Bell, pastor of the Roberts
Park M. E. church, told the Meth-
odist district conference, Monday,
that Methodist ministers are waging
a fight alone for retention of the
eighteenth amendment.

"The ministers even are in jeop-
ardy of their jobs when they stand
in the pulpit and preach the mes-
sage of prohibition," he said.

Study Cases of Several City Men.**


Marion county men whose pleas
for parole or commutation of sen-
tence in the Indiana state prison or
reformatory will be heard May 3 to
5 by the state commission of clem-
ency include the following in the
prison:

Charles Irwin, life term for mur-
der, who was sentenced Dec. 19,
1922; Claude Parker, ten years, bank
robbery; Charles B. Lafollette, ten to
twenty-one years, robbery and grand
larceny; Frank Myles, robbery;
Vincent Perdion, auto banditry, ten
years, and Frank Randles, criminal
attack, life term.

Reformatory prisoners to present
pleas include Charles Ashley, serving a
ten-year term for robbery, and
Ashton Burnett, fifteen years for
robbery.

in the statehouse Annex.




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
