

EARL CHAPPELL ARRESTED FOR PARDON FRAUD

Man Missing Since March
28 Is Prisoner Here in
County Jail.

Missing since March 28, Earl Chappell, wanted in a \$700 pardon swindle, was arrested Monday night, and is a prisoner today in county jail.

Chappell faces charges of obtaining money under false pretense, larceny, carrying concealed weapons and discharging a firearm in the city limits.

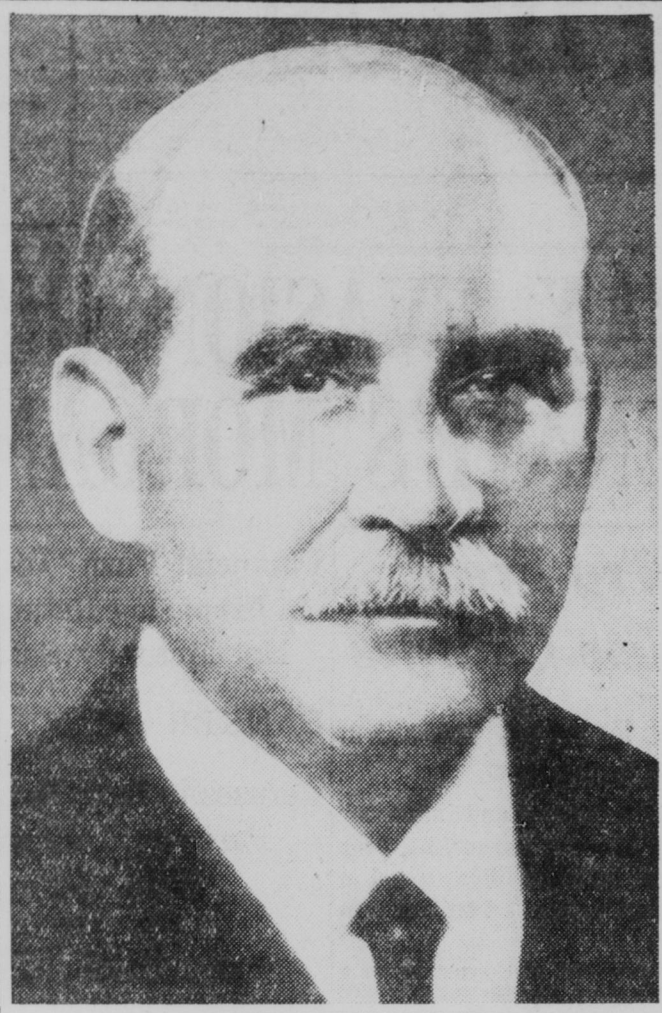
He was arrested by detectives shortly after he left a house in the vicinity of Illinois and Fourteenth streets.

Robert Burris, 42, and a man whose name has not been disclosed, as he is a fugitive, are accused with Chappell of swindling Mrs. Frieda Hitch, 520 North Meridian street, of \$700 on the representation that they could obtain a parole or pardon for John Hitch, her husband, serving a ten-year prison term for bank robbery.

Burris, according to police, has been identified by Mrs. Hitch as having posed as Wayne Coy, secretary to Governor Paul V. McNutt, in charge of state institution matters. She saw a newspaper picture of Coy and realized that he was not the man with whom she dealt.

In addition to the swindle and larceny charges, Chappell is accused of firing several shots in a poolroom at New York and Illinois streets.

M'NUTT NAMES STATE BANKING COMMISSIONERS

New Group to Take Posts
July 1: McKinley Will
Remain Director.

New state banking commissioners, who will have charge of the department of financial institutions beginning July 1, were named today by Governor Paul V. McNutt.

They are:
Oscar P. Welborn, University Club, treasurer of Wabash college and former vice-president of the Fletcher American National bank, who represents large banks on the new board.

Harvey B. Hartsock, 59 Hawthorne lane, Indiana Farm Bureau attorney, representing agriculture and credit unions.

C. M. Setser, vice-president of the Irwin State bank, Columbus, representing smaller banks.

Myron Gray, Muncie attorney and member of the study commission upon whose recommendations the new banking law was passed, representing building and loan associations.

Robert Batton, utility attorney and friend and adviser of McNutt, representing commercial and industrial interests.

Evans Woolen will act in an advisory capacity to the commission, the Governor said.

The commissioners will act in an advisory capacity until the new law is effective, the Governor said. Although they will have complete jurisdiction over all financial institutions, chartered by the state, their duties will be but part time and without pay.

FOUR GUNMEN HOLD UP BANK; MAKE ESCAPE

Lowell Institution Looted by
Gang; Get Away in
Large Sedan.

LOWELL, Ind., May 23.—The Lowell National bank was robbed of \$5,000 today by four bandits who fired several shots at random, but wounded no one.

The four bandits were seated in a car parked in front of the bank when Cashier T. A. Berg opened the institution for business at 9 a. m. After he and three other employees had entered the buildings three of the bandits followed with drawn pistols, while the fourth stood guard outside.

"Lie down and keep quiet,"

shouted the leader of the gang. Harry Love, a teller, was slow in complying with the request and the bandit leader shot twice into the floor at his feet. Love lay down.

Miss Mary Nichols, teller, and George Foster, assistant cashier, also were forced to lie down while the bandits looted the bank of all currency, securities and silver were untouched.

Leaving the bank the bandits found a crowd had gathered around the automobile, attracted by the bandit, who remained on guard with drawn pistol. They fired at random, hitting the heads of the crowd and into the automobile of Dr. J. S. Lowman, physician, who was walking across the street.

The bandit car was a large sedan bearing Indiana license 1933 No. 683,683. The license was issued to G. McClellan of Michigan City, but

authorities assume it had been stolen. The robbers fled northward and a posse was quickly organized to give chase.

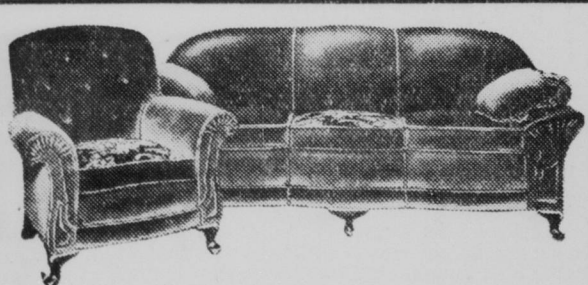
