

ASSASSIN FAILS IN ATTACK ON GREEK LEADER

Bitter Political Enemies of Venizelos Condemn Death Attempt on Ex-Premier.

ATHENS, Greece, June 7.—Bitter political enemies of Eleutherios Venizelos, many times premier of Greece and one of Europe's foremost statesmen, took charge of a search for his would-be assassins today as Premier Panagiotis Tsaldaris arose from a sick bed to denounce the gunmen as "enemies of the country's peace."

A carload of gunmen pumped more than twenty bullets into Venizelos' automobile Tuesday night.

He escaped injury, but his wife, Helen, was wounded, a guard was killed, and the chauffeur was slightly wounded.

Mme. Venizelos' wounds were not dangerous.

The cabinet, composed of Venizelos' enemies, met and issued a manifesto condemning the deed.

Hundreds of troops, gendarmes, and police were thrown into the district between the suburb of Kifissia and Athens, where the attack occurred.

One of the guards riding in the trailing car was struck by fifteen bullets. He died later.

Mme. Venizelos was taken to a hospital where four bullets were removed from her body.

Hostility toward Venizelos has been on the increase since he was defeated in the March elections.

He became premier of Greece the first time in 1910.

In 1915, he and King Constantine quarreled on the question of which side Greece was to take in the World war, and he resigned.

In 1917, the allies restored him to power. Since then he has been in and out of office numerous times. He is 69 years old.

Contract Bridge

PERHAPS the weakest original one bid at auction bridge was the original bid of one no trump, and many players have carried this same style of bidding through to contract. However, that is entirely wrong.

The better contract players today have abolished entirely the bidding of weak original no trumps. No trump is the most difficult contract to make, therefore it should be your strongest original one bid.

I was rather surprised to note that only one pair arrived at the grand slam in no trump in the following hand at the recent Ohio State Contract Championship Tournament.

At the table where the grand slam was made, South and West passed. North, with his powerful holding, opened with one no trump, which definitely showed his partner a very fine hand—one containing no singleton or weak doubleton.

South responded with two diamonds, which guaranteed a five-card suit, as you must not take a no trump bid out with a four-card suit.

North, now practically assured that the diamond suit would be solid, invited the slam by jumping to three no trump.

At several tables, South now went to six no trump, but one South player reasoned that if his partner could invite a slam with him holding a five-card suit headed by the king, a side ace and a queen,

then his hand was worth a try for seven.

If a spade is opened by East, the hand is a lay down. However, it requires an interesting squeeze play with the opening of the jack of clubs.

The trick is won in dummy with the ace and declarer runs off four heart tricks, discarding the six of spades on the fourth heart. West lets go a club and East a spade.

Declarer now starts the diamond suit, running four diamonds, winning the fourth diamond in dummy. East discards two spades, and West lets go clubs.

The fifth diamond is led from dummy, and West is helpless. He holds the king and nine of spades, and the queen and ten of clubs.

If he drops a club, declarer's king and nine of clubs will be good, while if he drops a spade declarer will make both his ace and queen of spades.

REVOLT STILL IS RAGING OVER VETERAN CUTS

House Democratic Leaders Ask Roosevelt for New Compromise Offer.

WASHINGTON, June 7.—House Democratic leaders sought from President Roosevelt today another compromise proposal to end the revolt against drastic veterans economy measures.

The move came in the face of indications that the administration considers senate increases a rebuke to the Democratic campaign platform.

House steering committee members submitted the compromise proposal to the President at a White House conference.

They were understood to have declared that his executive order Tuesday, liberalizing compensation reductions, failed to go far enough to beat down the revolt which several of them are aligned with.

At the same time it was learned

that the administration feels the Connally senate amendment to the independent offices supply bill, reducing veterans savings by \$170,000,000 violates the principle of the party platform and the Roosevelt economy program.

White House sources estimated that the President's executive order would only reduce savings by \$41,000,000, and would not unbalance the budget.

DOUBLE AUTO FEES ORDERED IN GOTHAM

JUNE 15 DEBT PAYMENT WILL BE DEFAULTED

France Will Not Meet Installment, Reliable Source Says.

PARIS, June 7.—The French government does not propose to pay either the defaulted Dec. 15 war debt payment to the United States or the one due June 15.

Although the cabinet has not formally made its decision, the United Press learned the government's attitude from an unimpeachable official source.

The government, especially Premier Edouard Daladier, opposes payment for the following reasons:

First, they know they would be overthrown by the Socialists and Nationalists in the chamber of deputies if they paid.

Second, they have been led to believe that Washington would prefer the debtor nations to default

rather than voluntarily grant them revision. It was understood that the French hope Britain will also default June 15, believing it would precipitate a general settlement and aid the success of the world economic conference.
