

HUGE DROP IN VALUATION OF COUNTY SEEN

Two Cuts Will Total Near \$24,000,000: May Mean Levy Boost.

Assessed valuations of real estate and personal property in Center township, Woodruff Place and Beech Grove will drop \$1,680,850, compared to 1932, according to estimates made today by assessors to County Auditor Charles A. Grossart.

An estimated \$12,000,000 drop in the assessed valuations of domestic corporations in Marion county is made by the county board of review.

The two cuts in valuations, totaling approximately \$24,000,000, amount to about one and one-half cents on the county tax rate.

It means that if the county council, in considering the budgets of county departments, should keep appropriations at the same level as last year, it would necessarily increase the tax rate one and one-half cents.

On the basis of budgets now in the hands of the county auditor the county tax rate is 12 cents higher than last year, and with the added one and one-half cents raise, due to valuation cuts and the possibility of a heavy pruning of the assessed valuation of utilities and banks, additional burden is placed on county solons in meeting the budget of 1932.

LAUNCH DRIVE TO END 'OLD AGE' FACTORY BAN

Circulate Petitions to Modify State Employment Law.

By United Press FT. WAYNE, Ind., Aug. 4.—A city-wide canvas in an effort to secure signatures of 50,000 persons favoring modification of the state law, which it is claimed, makes it prohibitive for factories of Indiana to hire men more than 45 years of age, is to be conducted here.

Announcement of the plan came today from August Klein, who stated that he was working through the Federation of Labor organization here.

Klein said that because of insurance regulations in the state, factories would not hire the older men. As a result, there is no source of income for the majority of men more than 45 years of age until they reach 70 and are eligible for the old-age pension.

HUNGER RELIEF LOAD IN NATION DWINDLING

Improvement Gradual Since Start of Recovery Program.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—The President's re-employment program has had an effect already on hunger relief rolls.

Harry L. Hopkins, federal emergency relief administrator, said today the nation's relief load definitely is coming down.

The only figures his administration has compiled cover the period during which the recovery program was pending in congress, and was swinging into its stride immediately after passage, but even at that time the relief burden began to lighten. Estimates indicate the effect has been greater the last month.

Part of the improvement is due to the summer season, Hopkins says, but the curse for this summer is far more favorable than that of a year ago.

GODTHAAB, Greenland, Aug. 4.—Colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh were back at Holstenborg today after a flight over Baffin Land, which is above Hudson Bay at the northern end of Canada.

Leaving Holstenborg at 1:20 p.m., they crossed the 200 miles of Davis strait, over the barren country and returned at 6:05.

The flight was regarded as important as the Lindberghs are the only people to have flown over the almost unexplored country.

ELECTRIC TAX OFF CONSUMER AFTER SEPT. 1

Producers of Power Must Pay Levy After That Date.

Consumers of electricity no longer will be required to pay the 3 per cent tax for electrical energy used after Sept. 1, according to the statement made by the bureau of internal revenue issued by Will H. Smith, state revenue collector, today.

The electric light companies and other vendors of electrical energy must assume the 3 per cent tax based on the price for which the energy is sold, the ruling states.

The law specifically provides that a publicly-owned electric and power plant will not be liable for tax on the electrical energy it sells, even though such energy is sold for domestic or commercial consumption.
