ville called at Wells' office today to report violations of the code and non-compliance of merchants in their cities.

Charles W. Chase, president of the Indianapolis Railways and "general" of the local forces to improve employment and investigate non-compliance with the code in Indianapolis, is to go to Washington Wednesday, following the meeting of his staff at the Chamber of Commerce building.

At the national capital, Chase will attempt to get detailed instruction from the recovery administration on work to be performed in Indianapolis, according to Wells.

### Florists Arrange Schedule

Following a meeting Monday, the Indianapolis Allied Florists' Association notified Wells that about fifty local stores have agreed to operate on a sixty-hour week, with no Sunday opening, pending acceptance of a national code at Washington.

While it was estimated that a total of 40,000 signed agreements from employers pledged to adhere to the NRA program had been received at the office of Francis Wells, Indiana recovery director, today, a dispute among local food store operators was to be settled definitely at a mass meeting in Tomlinson hall tonight.

### Grocers to Meet

Following a meeting Monday attended by representatives of large chain and individual grocery and meat stores and representatives of the Indianapolis Retail Meat and Grocers' Association, the meeting for tonight was called.

J. Eugene Hunsberger, secretary-manager of the association, said that the representatives had reached an agreement regarding opening and closing hours.

"We do not believe it would be wise to announce our plans until the mass meeting," said Hunsberger. "We think that it should be announced to all food store operators simultaneously at a meeting where the situation can be discussed openly."

### Grain Dealers Meet

More than six hundred grain dealers and millers met in conference at the Severin Monday to discuss their proposed code. A number of amendments were proposed for submission to the national government.

Apartment Owners Association and the Indianapolis Real Estate Board will study the NRA program at two meetings at the Washington this week. The apartment owners will hear Wells Wednesday at noon. The meeting of the realtors is scheduled for Thursday.

A meeting of the local barbers' union will be held tonight at 312 East Washington street to discuss the recently adopted barbers' code.

## DENISON RAZING TO BE STARTED IN THIRTY DAYS

Filling Station, Terminal to  
Occupy Site of Old  
Hostelry.

Work of razing the old Denison hotel, Indianapolis' leading hostelry in the gay 90s, will start within thirty days, Norman A. Perry, co-owner, advised the zoning commission Monday, when permission was given to remove the building, and erect a temporary parking, bus, and filling station on the site.

Permission to remove the structure because it was unable to earn even enough to pay taxes by more than \$11,000 a year, and that because fire rate on the "conflagration block"

was \$2.36 per \$100, while other hotels in the downtown area paid only 31 cents," was asked in the petition, filed by Franz W. Fackler.

The zoning board also granted permission for erection of a filling station at Capitol avenue and Maple Road boulevard. This is a direct reversal of previous action by the board, as all other attempts to erect filling stations on boulevards have met with defeat.

The Linwood Christian church was granted permission to lease part of its property at Linwood avenue and East Michigan street for a filling station, following its promise to the board to pay taxes on the leased ground.

Chester L. Pollitt obtained permission to build seven chicken houses on the rear of his lot at 2121-29 North Sherman drive. Installation of three gasoline pumps in the rear of the northeast corner of Belle View place and Tenth street was granted to Frank Kersey.

Permission for the Standard Grocery Company to build two drive-in parking markets also was granted by the board. One market will be built at 1009 North Dearborn street, and the other at 6236 Bellefontaine street.
