

M'NUTT CHILD HEALTH SETUP IS EXPLAINED

Maternal Welfare Work to Be Placed Under School of Medicine Also.

Governor Paul V. McNutt's plan of placing the department of child health and maternal welfare of the state under the Indiana university school of medicine was outlined for doctors today by Dr. O. N. Torian of the department of pediatrics of the school.

Under the title, "The Indiana Plan," Dr. Torian gives details of the new setup, including various committees' personnel, warrants a state-wide program of child health is to be worked out.

The article appears in the current issue of the Journal of the Indiana State Medical Association.

Formerly child and maternal welfare work was under Dr. A. E. Schweitzer, with a \$65,000 annual budget. Now it is to be handled through the school, with approval and co-operation of the state and county medical associations.

Two Educational Measures

This dominance of the organized medical profession in the reorganized public health plans of Indiana was scored roundly recently by Dean C. E. A. Winslow of the Yale university public health department, writing in the August Survey Graphic.

A committee appointed by the university drafted the plan of procedure, and approval from the State Medical Association was procured, Dr. Torian points out.

Two educational measures are to be carried out at this time. They consist of post-graduate teaching for physicians and lectures to child health organizations.

Dr. Torian, as chairman of child health, appointed state-wide committees of doctors on post-graduate teaching, child health and welfare organization, pre-school child immunization and tuberculosis.

Dr. A. M. Mendenhall of Indianapolis is chairman of maternal welfare and Dr. E. E. Voyles of dental activities.

National Recovery Act

NATIONAL RECOVERY ACT
REGULATION OF COMPETITION
CONTROLLED PRODUCTION

The law authorizes formation of trade and industrial associations which will draw up "codes of fair competition" for self-government, which must have presidential approval. The codes will regulate working hours, fix minimum wages, ration production, and regulate competition. The government can force minorities to comply, compel organization of associations, and prevent abuses, through a licensing system.



President Roosevelt said: "History probably will record the National Recovery Act as the most important and far-reaching legislation ever enacted by an American Congress. It represents a supreme effort to stabilize for all time the many factors which make for the prosperity of the nation."



The act also provided \$3,300,000,000 for public works to make jobs. Part will be spent on warships, federal buildings, river and harbor improvements, and the Tennessee Valley development. Gifts—not loans—may be made to states and cities for roads, docks, sewers, etc. A separate organization will have charge of this, under direction of Secretary of the Interior Harold I. Ickes.
