

FOUR IN PARADE CROWD HURT AS CYCLIST STUNTS

Motorcycle Rider Is Fined \$50 for Mishap by Judge Sheaffer.

Careening wildly into a closely packed crowd at Meridian and St. Clair streets during the NRA parade Monday, a motorcycle ridden by a would-be stunt rider injured four persons.

Panic stricken as the roaring machine cut a wide swath through the spectators, numerous persons were scratched and bruised as the crowd milled to safety.

Charges of reckless driving and assault and battery were placed against William Kolthoff, 26, of 61 North Fourteenth avenue, Beech Grove, rider of the motorcycle.

'I'm Awfully Sorry' Today in court, Kolthoff burst into tears when questioned by Municipal Judge William H. Sheaffer.

In answering the stern queries of the court, Kolthoff replied: "I never thought about hurting the people. I have done that stunt before many times without an accident. All I can say is that I'm awfully sorry."

He was fined \$50 and costs and his driver's license revoked for ninety days. When unable to pay the fine and costs, he was taken to the county jail. The assault and battery charge was dismissed.

Police on duty near the scene calmed the crowd and protected Kolthoff from a beating. According to witnesses, Kolthoff stood in the saddle of the machine and attempted to guide it with motions of his body.

Burrows Into Crowd Losing control, Kolthoff was unable to check the course of the machine as it dived to the north side of Meridian street and burrowed into the dense crowd.

Mrs. Fern Jackson, 26, of 209 East North street, with an ankle injury, and Carrie Florea, 13, of 732 Pine street, with scalp wounds, were taken to city hospital for treatment.

The police first-aid car, in charge of James Senteny, was called for first-aid duty and treated Mrs. Jennie M. Whitaker, 3348 North Capitol avenue, for a sprained ankle, and Mary Carson, 7, of 808 North East street.

Crossing the street in front of his home Monday, 6-year-old Kenneth Sutherland, 1035 North Beville avenue, was struck by an automobile and suffered a fracture of one shoulder. He was taken to city hospital.

Alleged Drunk Held Clarence Ballinger, 53, of 826 North Tacoma avenue, driver of the car, was not held when police said the accident was unavoidable.

After his automobile crashed into a parked car, Robert M. Collier, 43, of 810 East Twenty-first street, was arrested on charges of drunkenness and operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor Monday night.

C. Y. Cox, 2613 Broadway, reported to police that his car was parked in front of the house when Collier struck it. Collier's car was sent to a police garage.

When an automobile driven by his father collided with an East Tenth street car at Massachusetts avenue and Michigan street early this morning, Fred Walden, 26, of 1250 Eugene street, received a cut over his right eye. He was taken to city hospital for treatment.

Held in Auto Theft Youth Seen Entering Stolen Car Is Nabbed by Police.

Seen to enter an automobile that had been reported stolen, Dea Seaman, 17, of 222 East Wabash street, Monday afternoon was arrested by Captain Helm in the 200 block, East Ohio street.

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GOVERNOR UPHELD IN SHIFTING OF OFFICES

Power Over Commission Is Backed by Lutz.

Another provision of the statute giving Governor Paul V. McNutt control of major state departments was upheld today in a ruling by Attorney-General Philip Lutz Jr. Requested by Wayne Coy, McNutt's secretary, for a ruling regarding the legality of the Governor's taking over duties of the building and grounds commission, Lutz declared today that such acts are legal.

McNutt has the authority, according to the ruling, to shift office locations, and order other changes in the statehouse and grounds without consulting the commission.

The ruling is regarded as another victory by McNutt over Secretary of State Frank May Jr. and State Auditor Floyd Williamson, since they are members of the commission.

Lutz declared that the reorganization measure legally transferred duties of the commission to the de-

partment of public works, in which McNutt also is the most important member.

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DRIVER HELD IN TRUCK TRAGEDY FATAL TO SIX

Admits Collision Causing Deaths; 'Scared at All the Bodies,' Fled.

By United Press SOUTH BEND, Ind., Aug. 22.—Harold Schaab, 33, of Chicago, was held today on his confession that he was the driver of a truck that collided with another near here early Saturday, killing six persons en route to their home near Waukegan, Ind., after a holiday at the world's fair.

Schaab was driving a truck for the Cleveland Cartage Company. After trying to get neighbors to telephone for ambulances, he said, "I got scared at seeing all the bodies and went on in to Chicago."

An Indiana state police officer traced Schaab's truck from a piece of tire ripped off during the crash. Schaab was to be questioned today, and was expected to be held to the grand jury on manslaughter charges. His stepson, George, 19, who was riding in the truck cab with Schaab, also was held.

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
