

TODAY IS FINAL FOR OBSERVING NRA AGREEMENT

64,000 Employers in Fold:
More Than 700 Protests
Are on File.

With more than 700 alleged violations of NRA employer agreements filed with the Indianapolis office of the United States department of commerce, 64,000 employers in the state today had passed the deadline for compliance with the President's code.

"Today is the deadline for putting into effect all blanket agreements already signed," said Francis Wells, Indiana representative of the United States department of commerce. "If firms have signed agreements, there is no excuse after today for failing to comply with the provisions of the national industrial recovery act."

Less Than 90,000

Wells declared that the potential number of firms subject to agreement with the President's NRA program would be less than the 90,000 formerly expected from the state.

No action will be taken against Indianapolis violators of the NRA until the return of Charles W. Chase, "general" of the local recovery arm from Washington. Chase is expected back in the city today or Saturday.

In an unofficial report made public by L. F. Shuttleworth, retailer and a member of the district recovery board, A. T. Whiteside, deputy national recovery administrator was quoted as saying in Washington that NRA does not encourage unlimited operation of retail stores.

Wells refused to comment on Shuttleworth's statement until he hears definitely from Washington on the question. Requests have been made to Washington to clarify this matter and also the status of some salespeople working on commission.

Protest Is Drafted

Emergency meetings of the Indiana state and district boards were called by Wells for Thursday and the following protest drafted:

"At a meeting of our district recovery board today, a resolution was passed asking your committee to give consideration to the ruling emitting from your office recently to the effect that inside salesmen working on a commission basis prior to June 15, 1933, yet could be employed on that basis."

"A number of larger business houses in this city and in the state were consulted and it is their opinion, as it is ours, that this interpretation, a change from a previous ruling, would have the effect of leaving a wide opening for evasions and would tend toward permitting longer hours of employment at a rate of pay less than that established since your previous ruling was made."

Guaranteed Is Asked

"Your district recovery board believes that two main objectives, re-employment and stabilization, will not be served best by this late interpretation of the act as it applies to inside commission salesmen."

"We are convinced that the retail trade generally would prefer that the maximum number of hours and minimum rate of pay should be guaranteed to inside commissioned salesmen."

Signed agreements from 65,890 Indianapolis housewives and other consumers have been filed at the Chamber of Commerce as a result of the survey made by 3,500 volunteer NRA workers.

Other reports from survey workers disclosed that 4,138 Indianapolis business firms have added 5,873 new employees and \$112,975.63 to their weekly pay rolls since start of the NRA drive.

Survey on unemployment to date reveals 14,281 city men and 5,742 women out of work.
