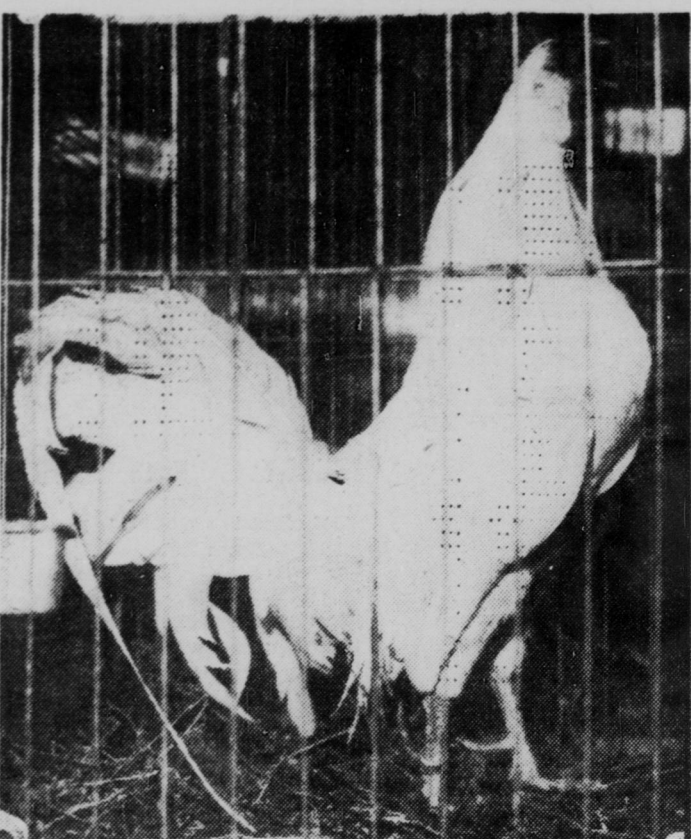

APPEALS STRIKE AT MUNICIPAL UTILITY PLANTS

High Court to Hear Two Unusual Points on Ownership.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—Two appeals raising unusual and important points against principle and practice of municipal operation of electric plants will be laid before the supreme court when it reconvenes early in October.

One, by the Seattle Gas Company, seeks a ruling invalidating the city's 3 per cent gross tax on earnings, on the ground that the city's own untaxed electric plant is a competing concern.

The company, which lost in the Washington state supreme court, contends that imposition of the tax, which amounted to \$5,500 for the first month, would deprive it of its property, impair its franchise contracts, and result in "an oppressive and confiscatory exercise of a governmental power of taxation in aid of its proprietary business of selling electric light and power for profit."

The ordinance imposes the tax on gas and water sales, and specifically requires that the city itself must pay this tax on any gas and water it sells.

The other case, appealed by the Texas Electric Service Company, in-

volves an attempt to enjoin Fairbanks, Morse & Co. electrical contractors from getting municipalities to plant equipment manufacturers, the power company's customers.
