

U. S. PRISONER CAN PUT BLAME UPON CURIOSITY

Inquiries About Mann Act
Case Brings Raid by
Police Squad.

Edward Renaud, alias Jack Pringle, languished today within the confines of the Marion county jail, cogitating on the inscrutability of fate.

As he sat and pondered, the thought came to him that while curiosity may not have "killed a cat," it certainly played a part in his present predicament.

It was the curiosity of a young man, whose name is being withheld by authorities, that resulted in federal officials getting a lead on the hideout of Renaud, or Pringle, who was wanted on a Mann act charge.

Two young women had been arrested in the case and when the unnamed young man visited the United States marshal's office and exhibited too much interest in the case, he was held and taken before the grand jury, where he decided to talk.

As a result, Harry E. Gates, deputy marshal; a department of justice operative and a police squad under Sergeant Martin Fahey conducted a raid on a rooming house at 424 West New York street, where Renaud, or Pringle, was arrested.

As Fahey entered the rear yard of the premises, his hair stood on end and nearly turned gray, when a police dog, described by Gates as being "as big as a pony," lunged at him.

Fahey's heart gradually slowed up to a nearly normal beat when he discovered that the dog was chained and its lunge was brought up short.

Renaud was said by police to have served terms in three prisons in New York, one in Michigan, and at the Indiana state farm, from which he escaped July 10 after serving only a few weeks. He is reported to have wounded a guard at the Elmira (N. Y.) reformatory in an escape attempt.

MAYOR ANXIOUS TO HEAR TALKS ON FEDERAL AID

Sullivan May Go to Chicago
for Convention of City
Executives.

Mayor Reginald H. Sullivan will attend the United States Conference of Mayors, at Chicago Friday and Saturday of this week, providing the adoption of the budget by the county advisory board is completed by that time.

An invitation to attend, designating this meeting "the most important ever held," was received by Sullivan early this month, but budget trouble has caused him to delay acceptance.

Mayor Sullivan is anxious to attend and hear the explanation by Harold L. Ikes, interior secretary and public works administrator, on public works programs for cities.

This may be beneficial as Sullivan has a definite program in mind to obtain public works money from the federal government, for improvements at the city hospital and sanitary district and street improvements.

He has hesitated in applying for the funds, however, because of his determination "not to bond the city into bankruptcy."

The mayor also is interested in the proposed address of Ray T. Miller, Cleveland mayor, who will tell of the housing and slum clearance activities in that city, which along with Indianapolis, is one of the three cities to comply with requirements for obtaining money for the work.

Indianapolis already has been allotted \$4,460,000 by the government for slum clearance. An additional 15 per cent is to be raised by a local committee before the money is forthcoming, however.

Clerk Forced to Lie on
Floor as Drawer Is
Ransacked.

Brandishing a revolver and carrying a paper sack to hold the loot, a bandit held up the night clerk at the Graylyn hotel, 1043 North Pennsylvania street, shortly before midnight and obtained \$105.

Craft said the bandit was about 23 years of age, 5 feet 6 inches, weighed about 145, and wore a small mustache, dark blue suit and light cap.

Plaintiffs in the suits are Louis Bassler, his wife Mary and daughters Margaret and Alice, together with Joseph Bassler, administrator of the estate of Rose Bassler.

The complaints allege that the family was riding in their automobile on State Road 41 near St. Johns in Lake county when the accident occurred, Aug. 13.
