

FISHBEIN RAPS MASS MEDICAL CARE TENDENCY

Family Physician's Rights Are Defended at Convention.

Addressing the health officers section of the American Public Health Association convention, Dr. Morris Fishbein, famed editor of the journal of the American Medical Association, and native of Indianapolis, sounded a note of warning against encroachment by public health departments on the legitimate functions of the medical profession.

"The physician for most people still is the key man in all matters affecting health," he said in his address delivered yesterday.

The knowledge of dissemination of infectious diseases that have come since the bacteriological epoch in medicine has made necessary some common meeting ground for the diffusion of information, said Dr. Fishbein.

Most Practice Individual

This, and rightly so, obviously is the public health officer, he asserted. "The vast majority of medical practice is individual," he said.

"The family physician is so called because he concerns himself with keeping intimately in touch with all of those aspects of the lives of his patients in their families that may be concerned with health and diseases," he said.

"The physician who has witnessed the birth of a child, who has taken it through the various vicissitudes of childhood and adolescence, is far better able to judge the severity of the diseases that come on in middle life than one that sees his patient for the first time.

Hits at Clinic Tests
"Why, then, should public health officials attempt to take away from this family doctor the responsibility for individual prevention of disease?"

He particularly deprecated the attempt made by public health departments to have children examined prior to their entrance into school in large clinics.

"Although the individual examination costs more, it is worth more," he said. "The cursory examination made available in such mass application of the ideals of preventive medicine can not begin to compare in efficiency or usefulness with the type of study made by the individual physician," he added.

Invasion Is Resented
"The medical profession," said Dr. Fishbein, always has stood, and still stands, in favor of public health work of the right kind, properly conceived and competently directed for the better health of the community.

However, it does not feel obligated to indorse unwise, visionary, or inefficient projects merely because they are launched in the name of the public health," he said.

"Nowhere, so far as I know, have physicians suggested the elimination or abolition of health departments. However, they have resented invasion of the legitimate functions of the medical profession."

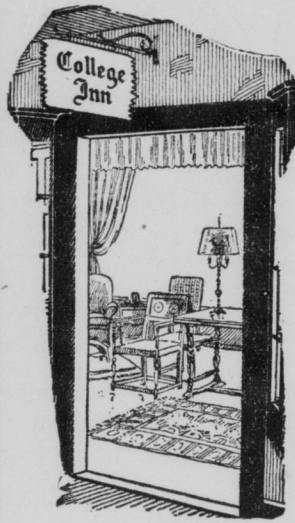
FIGHT WOUNDS ARE FATAL TO CITY RESIDENT

Chairman of Board in Charge of Branch in City.

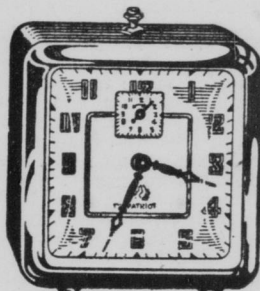
Branch office of the Federal Land bank of Louisville, was established today in the house of representatives at the statehouse.
