Convention Will Begin With
President's Dinner at
Y. W. C. A.

Sixteenth annual convention of the W. C. T. U. of Indiana will bring together presidents of seventy-two counties at the annual "Presidents' dinner" tonight in the Y. W. C. A. auditorium. Arrangements for the meeting are in charge of Mrs. Robert McKay, Indianapolis, retiring president of Marion county W. C. T. U.

Dr. Irby J. Good, president of Indiana Central college, will deliver the principal address. He will speak on "Why Continue Temperance Education Among Our Young People?" Mrs. Elizabeth T. Stanley, Liberty, state president; Mrs. Ida M. Mix, Kokomo, vice-president; Miss Mary E. Woodard, Fountain City, corresponding secretary; Mrs. Mary C. Donnell, Greensburg, recording secretary; Mrs. Stella C. Stimson, Indianapolis; Mrs. Bessie Julius, Munroe, secretary of the Loyal Temperance Legion, and Bernice Addison, New Palestine, secretary of young peoples branch and the state trustees will be guests of honor.

Miss Esther Becker of Indiana Central college, head of the music department, will sing. Mrs. Fred Stucky, Indianapolis, will give a dramatic reading of a temperance play.

EXECUTIVES TO CONFER

Following the dinner, members of the executive committee will hold a conference. The state trustees will meet this morning in the Y. W. C. A. The official board will meet Thursday afternoon. The board of directors also will meet Thursday afternoon.

The convention will open with a "crusade prayer and praise" service tomorrow morning at 8:30, in charge of Mrs. Stella Doty, Frankfort, state director of evangelism. Mrs. Stanley will call the convention to order at 9:15. Dr. William E. Bell, pastor of Roberts Park M. E. church, will give the invocation and welcome address. The first convention session will be held in Roberts Park M. E. church.

Following the presidential address by Mrs. Stanley tomorrow afternoon, a delegation of "white ribboners" will go to the statehouse rotunda and place a wreath before the bronze plaque of Frances E. Willard, which was dedicated at the national convention in 1929.

For several years, Mr. Smith was associated with the former Homer McKee advertising agency of this city, and lived here with his wife and two children.


Mr. Smith will be in charge of advertising Grape-Nuts, the company's oldest cereal.


