democratic program by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

2. Full approval by the American Association of University Women.

3. Approval of the Butler university college of education by the American Association of Teacher Training Institutions.

Installed New System

4. Full membership in the American Association of Urban Universities.

5. Installation of a complete system of intramural athletics.

6. Reorganization and standardization of intercollegiate athletics.

7. Installation of student activity books in the interest of student health and recreation.

8. Institution of new university administrative agencies, such as the deans' council, student welfare agencies, student budget committee, thus adapting the machinery of administration of the university to the needs of a growing institution.

9. Enlargement and improvement of student health service, including a full-time university physician.

10. Additions to Thespis room.

11. Enlargement and additions to the university library, including catalogue room, reference room and new stacks.

12. Additions to provisions for admission and classification of students.

13. Addition of a department of student personnel, including a system of freshman advisers.

Installed Psychological Clinic

14. The installation of a psychological clinic, with a staff of three specialists.

15. Reorganization of the college of education on a collegiate and graduate basis.

16. Created a graduate college of religion.

17. Inaugurated a department of religion in the college of liberal arts and sciences.

18. Equipped the department of journalism with presses, linotype and composition room.

19. Created a department of fine arts in the college of liberal arts and sciences, with a closer working affiliation with the Arthur Jordan conservatory of music than had been available before.

20. Enlarged the scope and services of the evening and extension courses to include the whole scope of adult education.

21. Created a graduate study division with a graduate studies council.

22. Established a system of chapels in the college of liberal arts and sciences.

23. Established prevocational courses in engineering, forestry and other vocational fields.

24. Fostered the organization of a mothers' council for the co-operation of parents and faculties in the welfare of students.

25. Instituted a men's union building.

26. Founded a monthly news bulletin for alumni and friends of the university.

27. Codified the rules and regulations of the university for annual publication in a students' handbook.

28. Instituted a series of scientific studies in university costs, inaugurated economies in operations and speeded up efficiency in all departments.

29. I have conducted extended studies in the problems of university housing, mortality of students, athletic control, and general university finance. From a wide inquiry into current university practices I was building a blue print of the Butler university of the future which would serve the cultural, professional and vocational needs of a great metropolitan area.

Budget Reduced \$200,000

During the past two years I have successfully reduced the current budget of the university more than \$200,000, without lowering educational standards. During my administration we have lived well within the adopted budget. For the current year tuition receipts exceed the budget estimates; receipts from endowment are entirely within your control.

There has been no increase in the indebtedness of the university because of budget overdrifts or unwise financial ventures on the part of the academic leaders of the university.

Butler university has suffered from the general financial depression as have all other educational institutions, but it has sought to

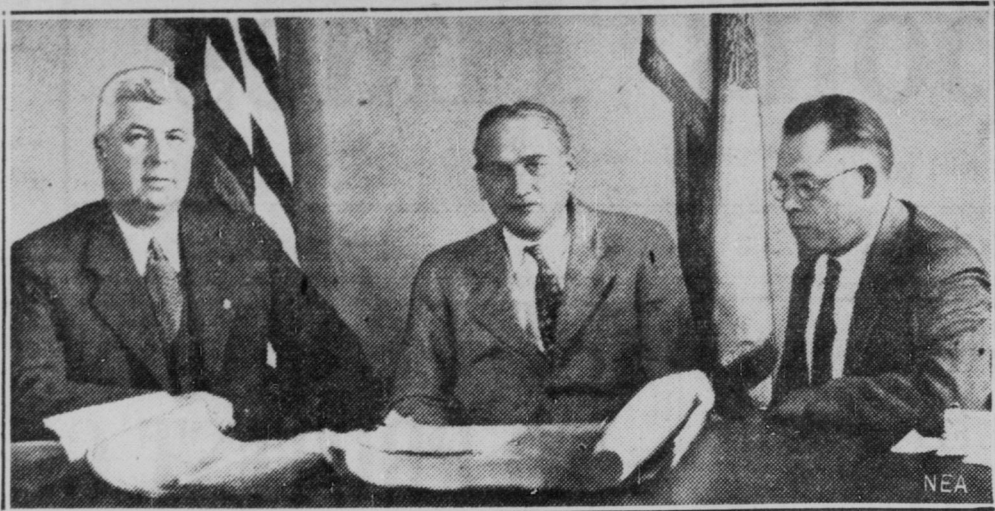

live within its income without lowering its educational standards, and I am proud of its achievements in this respect.

Few of Achievements

The foregoing are but a few of the achievements of two very difficult years of service to Butler university. I inherited very many serious problems. I came into my new duties at a very difficult period. I found a faculty of professionally minded scholars, and a splendid student body ready for leadership, and we were making rapid progress in the building of a greater Butler when, without warning, and without a hearing, your committee brought me the verdict of a meeting of the board of directors which terminates my services at Butler university.

You suggest that I save my face or that of the board by resigning. I have no reason for resigning. I am in splendid health, at a point in my educational career where I can render my greatest service. I therefore decline to resign, and accept my discharge without a hearing in the hope that at some future time I may learn the reasons for this unusual procedure.

I regret that your committee did not react favorably to my suggestion that a committee of nationally known educational experts be appointed to survey Butler university, to analyze its present problems and to recommend future procedure. You will recall that I agreed to abide by the decision of such a committee.

May I say in concluding this statement that, in my opinion, among all the problems here at Butler university is that of a dual leadership. I came to Butler university with the understanding that I was to be president of the whole university. I soon found that I was president only in name, that the real control was vested in a small board committee housed in a downtown office.

This committee was the absentee-landlord which dominated the policies of the university, and that the academic policy must conform to the "downtown" policy or trouble would ensue.

Victim of Dual Control

"There is at Butler, and has been for many years, this dual administration; one is financial, political, noneducational, the other leadership centers with the educational problems of the campus, it seeks the best interest of the whole university, it chafes under the interference of political control. Before Butler university can prosper its leadership must be unified on a very high academic and social level. I am a victim of this dual control. I accept the inevitable and go the way which has been traveled by my immediate predecessors.

Mrs. Athearn and I have been happy here. We have had the hearty co-operation of faculties and students. We have been given a most cordial reception by the citizens of Indianapolis. We love the city and the state.

We leave with regret but without a personal malice toward any one. We especially wish that Butler university may yet find that administrative unity which will make possible a great urban university here at the "cross-roads of the nation."

at the point of a revolver drawn by Saunders.

"Is there any one downstairs besides the clerk?" Penn said Saunders asked.

When Penn replied negatively, Saunders is said to have asked Penn if he was sure.

"Well, I'm not sure, but I'll go see," Penn volunteered.

"O. K. You're a good guy and I won't hurt you," Penn said Saunders replied.

Racing to the first floor, Penn gave the alarm to Matthew Breeding, 35, of 2828 East Washington street, night clerk, who summoned police.

When Penn returned upstairs,

Saunders met him in the hall and was taken to the first floor. Meanwhile, patrolman Pat White and Pat O'Neal, armed with shotguns, had taken stations guarding the elevator door. Saunders surrendered without resistance.

Detectives at headquarters said that Saunders during the questioning announced that "he could clear up a lot of jobs."

Most important of Saunders' disclosures, according to police, are details regarding the holdup June 23 of the restaurant operated by John Rodocker, at 618 East Walnut street, where it was reported that \$2,500 was obtained.

Saunders said, however, that only \$1,000 was obtained, according to police. It was in this holdup that Marlette and Miss Knox are involved, detectives claim.

Detectives who arrested Marlette this morning reported they found \$200 in bills hidden in his room, and that the bank wrappings were similar to those used on the money taken from the Rodocker restaurant.

Other holdups said to have been admitted by Saunders include the Meeker hotel, last Tuesday; the Lee pharmacy at 1043 Fairfield avenue; the City fruit store at 3522 College avenue; a Kroger grocery at 1029 North Alabama street, and a Piggly Wiggly store at Forty-second street and College avenue.

'SICK PRISONER' DECLARED FARM CRUELTY VICTIM

Clemency Plea Asserts Sufferer Forced to Do Heavy Work.

Charges of cruelties alleged to have been inflicted on a prisoner sentenced to the state penal farm for possession of a pint of liquor were barred today as the state clemency commission considered a plea for the commutation of the sen-

tence of Russell Bowen, Kokomo.

Bowen, according to Homer R. Miller, Kokomo attorney, who appeared before the board, was forced to work fourteen hours a night, seven nights a week.

Sentenced to thirty days at the farm and fined \$130, Bowen served out the term, according to Mr. Miller, and then was brought to the Marion county jail by federal agents to be held as a witness in the Olin R. Holt liquor conspiracy case.

After being held here as a witness for 129 days, Mr. Miller charged, Bowen was returned to the penal farm to serve out the \$130 fine.

Unable to stand the fourteen hours a night shift, according to Mr. Miller, Bowen escaped when his plea for a work transfer was delayed continually.

Captured, Bowen was sentenced to one to five years in the state prison on fugitives charges.

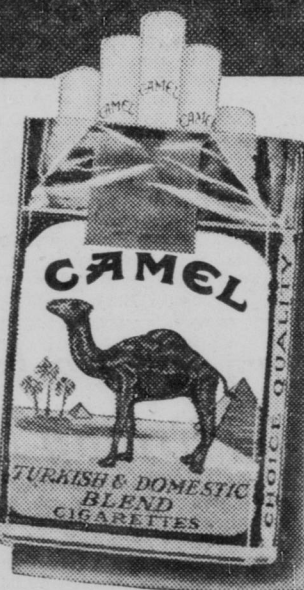

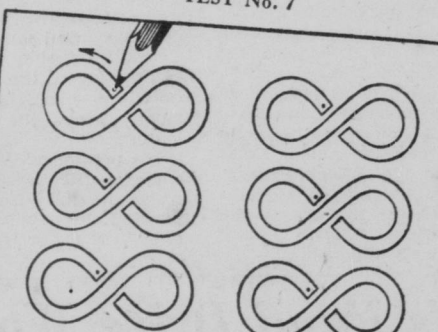
