

DEFENDANT IN KIDNAP TRIAL 'SEATED' AGAIN

Alleged Gang Chief Stops Co-Defendant in Effort to Rise.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 21.—Willie Sharkey, erratic gangster on trial with three other defendants on federal kidnapping charges, attempted to rise from his seat in the courtroom today and was pushed down by Roger "The Terrible" Touhy, another of those on trial.

The interruption occurred while defense attorney Thomas W. McMeekin was completing the reading of alibi depositions for Gustave "Gloomy Gus" Schaeffer.

It was the second time the rotund gangster had startled the courtroom with his eccentricity. Last week he started forward from his seat, but sat down when three deputy sheriffs closed in on him, and Judge M. M. Joyce shot a piercing glance his way.

Sharkey, Schaeffer, Touhy and Eddie McGraden are being tried on federal charges of transporting William Hamm Jr., wealthy brewer, to Wisconsin after kidnaping him for \$100,000 ransom.

Surrounded by other defendants, defense attorneys and guards, Sharkey was sitting listening to McMeekin today.

McMeekin's voice sounded monotonously. Suddenly Sharkey started to rise in the chair. Deputy sheriffs started forward. Touhy, however, was quick.

With one hand, the gangster gave Sharkey a shove that sent him back into the chair.

PASTORS FIGHT NAZI CONTROL

Evangelical Ministers Rise in Revolt Against 'Aryan' Trend.

BERLIN, Nov. 21.—Three thousand evangelical pastors were in revolt today against Nazi churchmen.

Church observances Sunday of the 450th anniversary of Martin Luther's birth were made the occasion for the reading from the 3,000 pastors' pupils of a manifesto complaining that high church officials failed to protest when the Rev. Reinhold Krause of the German Christian church faction, made a speech in their presence urging further "aryanization" of the church.

Herr Krause subsequently was dismissed from his church offices.
