

RILEY HOSPITAL TREATS 34,000, REPORTS SHOW

300 on Waiting List Now, Hugh McK. Landon Reveals.

More than 34,000 children have been treated at James Whitcomb Riley hospital for children since it was opened in 1924, and there is a waiting list of more than 300, Hugh McK. Landon, joint executive committee chairman, reported today.

Basing his figures on reports made by J. B. H. Martin, hospital administrator, Mr. Landon said the per diem cost at the hospital now is lower than at any time in the hospital's history, substantial reductions having been made in the last few months despite increased service.

Eighty-nine of the ninety-two counties in the state have been served in the last ninety days, he said. Average number of patients in the quarter ending Sept. 30 was 251, of which 201 were patients in the main hospital and fifty in the Rotary convalescent section. There were 1,115 operations in the quarter, and 667 casts were made for children.

Extension of service will be aided by recent gifts in wills, including the Arthur C. Newby bequest, Edmund Zoller bequest, Mrs. Charles W. Miller bequest and the Mary J. Proctor bequest, according to Mr. Landon.

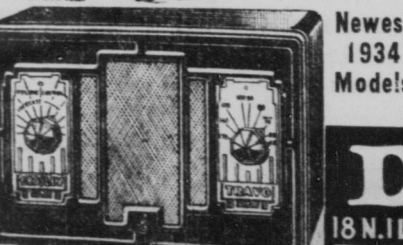
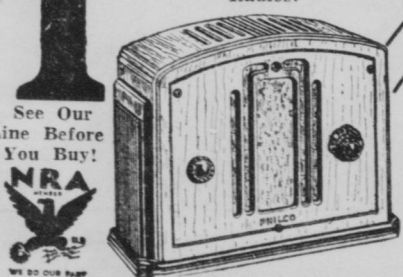
