

STATE HIGHWAY DETOUR SETUP CHANGES LITTLE

Commission Urges Careful Driving Where Work Is in Progress.

Few detour changes were made on state highways during the week, according to the state highway commission bulletin issued today.

Plan was made for co-operation of motorists in driving slowly past gangs of workmen engaged in shoulder widening.

Detours due to construction are:

Road 4—Detour from Crown Point west, account of paving, is nine miles over paved surface.

Road 9—Detour from Wolcottville north, account of paving, is one and one-half miles over good gravel. Detour from Huntington to one mile north of Road 114, account of paving, is eleven miles over good gravel and oil mat. Drive slowly over new pavement from Columbus City south, account of unfinished shoulders. Detour in Alexandria account paving is one mile over hard surface.

Road 10—Bridge run-around two miles east of Road 4.

Road 13—Detour from Ellettsburg north, account of paving, is five miles over gravel road. Short detour in Ellettsburg, account bridge construction, is over city street.

Road 14—Bridge run-around at six miles west of Ellettsburg. Detour from Silver Lake west, account of bridge construction, is one mile over good gravel. Detour just west of junction with Road 12, account construction of bridge approaches and road widening, is three miles.

Road 24—Detour from Logansport west, account of pavement construction, is eight miles over fair but narrow gravel.

Road 25—Three and one-half mile detour over good road just west of Logansport, account of bridge construction.

Road 34—Detour just west of Crawfordsville, account of building bridge approach, is two miles over gravel and oil mat.

Road 35—Detour from Morgantown to Bean Blossom, is ten and one-half miles, fair gravel, narrow.

Road 41—Detour from Huntington to New Salisbury, account paving overhead bridge approaches, is one and one-half miles over good gravel road with one dangerous railroad crossing.

Road 44—Impassable between Huntington and Stenders. Detour from New Albany to New Salisbury, account paving in Georgetown, is over Roads 62 and 35.

Road 67—Detour just south of Greensburg, account of bridge out, is two and one-quarter miles over good gravel.

Road 101—Detour from Roseburg to Brookville, account grading, is twenty-three miles, seventeenth miles paved, six miles good gravel.

DILLINGER HUNT SCENE SHIFTS

Chicago Once Again Pivot in Search for Terror Mob Leader.

RACINE, Wis., Nov. 24.—Authorities turned their search for members of the Dillinger gang to Chicago today, seeking to trace the handling of two \$1,000 bonds stolen from a Greencastle (Ind.) bank.

A Racine detective, seeking John Dillinger and members of his "terror mob" of escaped Indiana convicts as suspects in the \$26,000 hold-up of a Racine bank, went to Chicago yesterday with three Indiana state policemen.

Search of possible hide-outs in southern Wisconsin, to which officials first believed Dillinger and his companions had fled after the robbery, revealed no trace of the fugitives.

CITY IS NO. 6 IN PER CAPITA POLICE COSTS

Minneapolis Ranked First; Figure There \$2.73; Here \$3.65.

TRENTON, N. J. Nov. 24.—Police protection costs per individual were lower in Minneapolis for the last three years than in ten other cities of comparable population, a survey of the state chamber of commerce showed today.

The average in Minneapolis was \$2.73 compared with a general average of \$4.67 in all of the cities included in the survey.

The average per capita cost in other cities, according to the survey, was: Cincinnati, \$2.97; Kansas City, \$3.36; New Orleans, \$3.42; Louisville, Ky., \$3.58; Indianapolis, \$3.65; Rochester, N. Y., \$3.82; Seattle, \$4.03; Washington, \$6.41; Newark, \$7.89; Jersey City, \$10.29.
