

## MORGAN URGES CITY WOMEN TO STUDY HOUSING

Many Families Live Under Deplorable Conditions, Is Report.

Proposal of Dr. Herman G. Morgan, city health officer, that a group of women be assigned, under the civil works program, to study housing conditions of needy families in the city, is being studied by the civil works administration.

Reports have been received by Dr. Morgan that many of the city's indigent families, including those who have been on relief and some now on made-work projects, are living under deplorable conditions, without proper sanitary facilities, or even water in their homes.

Results of the survey would form the basis for a movement to relieve the condition.

The survey would be particularly valuable in studying condition of several hundreds of families in the city where there are advanced cases of tuberculosis, periling health of children.

The civil works administration yesterday approved 156 new projects, bringing the total to 1,290, employing 59,656 men, with total wages of \$9,719,171.

The first checks were for only part of the week, and checks Saturday should total several times as much, he said.

## 33 INDIANA COUNTIES GET TAX RATE CUTS

Total Reduction of \$477,005 Reported by Taxpayers Association.

Thirty-three Indiana counties obtained tax rate cuts for 1934 of \$477,005.72, according to a tabulation of state tax board figures made by Harry Miesse, secretary of the Indiana Taxpayers Association.

Appeals were taken from 306 governmental units. Mrs. Miesse said, Reductions were made in eighty-eight, one was increased and 217 unchanged.

Indianapolis school and civil city rates were unchanged. Cuts in tuition of Center, Lawrence and Warren townships accounted for reduction of \$25,194.40 in Marion county units.



Mr. Peters disclosed plans for the dinner while in Washington this week. He said that all state officials, including the Governor, had been invited.

would be unable to attend, since many months previously, he had promised to address the association of life insurance president at New York Dec. 8.

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
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
