VETERANS MAY HAVE CHANCE AT CCC JOBS

Figures on Possible Enrollment Asked by Washington.

All World war veterans may be given the opportunity to enroll in civilian conservation corps camps, it was indicated today in advices from Washington.

John O. Thistle, veterans' administration chief accountant, said today he has been asked to submit figures on the number of veterans who will accept immediate relief by employment in these camps.

Acceptance of all World war veterans probably would mean increasing the camp quotas, and the information probably is sought to provide information on the quotas to be fixed, it was said.

THREE HURT IN FIVE ACCIDENTS, NONE SERIOUSLY

Woman Struck by Car on U. S. Road, Suffers Hip Injuries.

Three persons were injured in five motor car accidents yesterday and early today.
