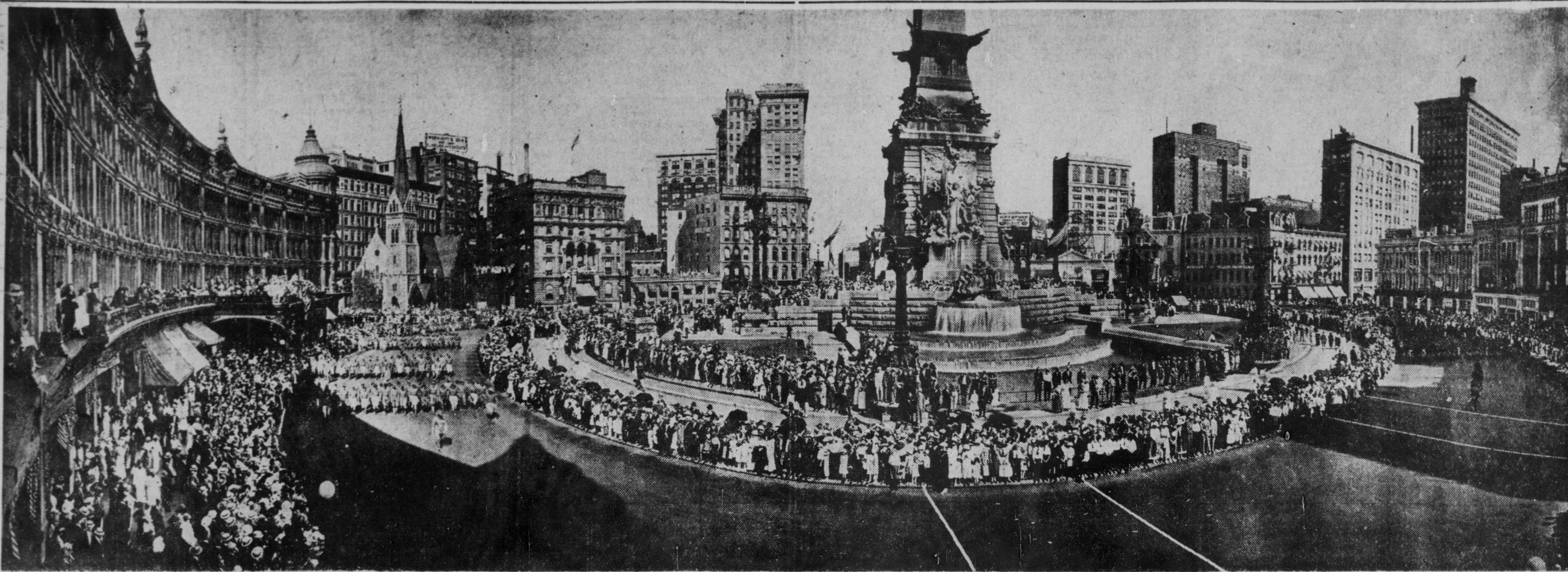


# When All Indianapolis Turned Out to Bid Its Soldiers Goodby

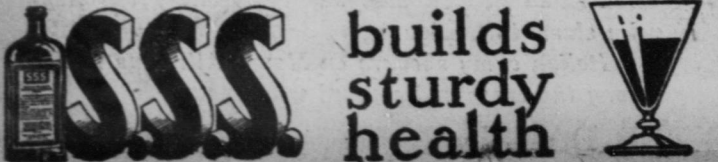

## ENROLLMENT GAINS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Second Semester Increase of 697 Pupils Announced.

Increase of 697 public school pupils was shown for the first week of the second semester, it was announced today by Superintendent Paul C. Stetson. High schools showed 508 gain and grade schools 189.

Largest increase was reported by George Washington high school, with 208. Arsenal Technical high school enrollment reached 6,107, with a gain of 165 pupils.

## URGES RETENTION OF CCC CAMPS IN STATE

Conservation Head Confident Thirty Units Will Continue.

Retention of the thirty civilian conservation corps camps in Indiana was anticipated today by Virgil M. Simmons, state conservation department head. The department has requested that the camps continue in the state. Twenty-four camps are on forestry and soil erosion projects and six camps are located in state parks improving state property. Approximately 6,000 men are enrolled.

"What's the matter with the American Legion?" is to be the subject of one of the Butler university forum series to be held at Jordan hall, Feb. 28, it was announced today.

Attack on the Legion's pension activities was made in one of the addresses by Samuel S. Wyer, Columbus, O., consulting engineer, at the Butler forum. This brought forth a defense from Commander V. M. Armstrong of the Indiana department of the Legion.

Mr. Armstrong is scheduled as one of the speakers at the forum Feb. 28. Others are Harold Plummer, assistant national adjutant, and Russell Kook, chairman of the national Americanization committee.

The public may come and question the speakers.

Next forum is Feb. 14, upon the subject of "The Smoke Menace of Our City." Attorney Henry M. Dowling and W. A. Hanley, director of engineering at the Eli Lilly Company, are speakers.

Arrangements are to be made later for forums on the Indiana liquor control law, Tugwell bill for more rigid food and drug regulation and on housing, it was announced.
