Lead State in Prevention Work, Certificate of Award Received.

Indianapolis won first place in the state and honorable mention in the nation for its fire prevention efforts in the last year. Bernard A. Lynch, chief of the city fire prevention division of the city fire department, revealed today.

A certificate of award was forwarded to the local department by the National Fire Protection Association in recognition of the city's appearance on the honor roll. Indianapolis won its place among a number of cities having a grade of 80 to 89 per cent.

Second place to the state went to Ft. Wayne. The city fire department conducted a campaign throughout the city in the observance of Fire Prevention week, Oct. 8 to 14.

Can't Take It Dillinger Fears Jails, Attorney Says.

CROWN POINT, Ind., Feb. 14.—The possible defense of John Dillinger, notorious bandit of the midwest, in charge of slaying a police officer was revealed today to be "claustrophobia."

Webster's dictionary defines claustrophobia as "the morbid fear of being confined."

Today Attorney Joseph E. Conroy, who said he represented Dillinger outlined the hopes of the defense.

"Dillinger is a victim of this strange disease," said Conroy.

"It explains why he has this fear of jails and prisons."

To Sheriff Lillian Holley, Indiana's only woman sheriff and responsible for the jail where the desperado is held, the defense theory came as the best laugh of the year.

"They all have a fear of being confined—especially in jails. I

shouldn't wonder if the prisoners

had their way that they wouldn't stay here at all."

SEEK JURY TO TRY TOUHY MOB

New Veniremen Will Be Called in Jake Factor Kidnapping Case.

CHICAGO, Feb. 14.—Bailiffs prepared lists of 300 veniremen today in the second trial of Roger Touhy and two fellow-gangsters on death penalty kidnapping charges as attorneys for state and defense rejected prospective jurors by dozens.

Wilbert F. Crowley, first assistant state's attorney, sought a jury qualified to inflict the newly provided death penalty for Illinois kidnapping convictions. Defense counsel William Scott Stewart worked to prevent the seating of any juror with a prejudice against "beer sellers before prohibition."

Touhy, Albert Kator and Gus Schaeffer are charged with kidnapping John (Jake the Barber) Factor for \$70,000 ransom. Their first trial ended in a disagreement. After the

first day of the present trial not a single juror had been accepted.

State's attorney's police meanwhile worked to connect two men arrested in Baltimore with the kidnaping. The men, Basil Banghart and Isaac Costner, were sought as

members of the gang which kidnapped Factor. While Factor viewed the suspects in Baltimore, police opened a safety deposit box for which a woman accompanying the men had a key. Nothing incriminating was found.

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
