

ACTRESS TELLS OF DIRECTOR'S ARDENT WOOLING

Almost Bought Her \$30,000 Car, She Says in Love Suit.

HOLLYWOOD, April 4.—Marjorie Gay, attractive young actress, weathered the crossfire of examiners today in an effort to bolster her claims for \$100,000 alleged breach of promise damages from Harry Joe Brown, 40-year-old film director. A self-possessed figure on the witness stand, she presented her case for cross-examination with a final account of the romance which she said once bound her and Brown together in a happy betrothal. Love ended bitterly for her, she complained, when the director married Sally Eilers without so much as a hint to her of his intentions. Miss Eilers listened intently as Miss Gay confided words of love which she said Brown whispered to her in 1929, as a prelude to their engagement.


Helped Select Auto  
"We were in Mr. Brown's apartment preparing for a party," the actress testified. "He had just finished shaving and was sitting on the floor, when he asked me to rub his head. While I was rubbing it he told me how much he loved me and asked me to marry him. I told him to give me some time for an answer."

A \$30,000 automobile she "almost got" from her purported fiance was described by the witness. She said: "I helped him select it. He said it had cost \$30,000 to build. He said lined with silk brocade. We used it a week on approval. He almost bought it."




