

## ELECTION OFFICE SWAMPED BY LAST-MINUTE ASPIRANTS FILING PRIMARY CANDIDACIES

Midnight Is Deadline, With Scores Seeking Lesser Offices Still Not on List; Major Office Seekers Entered.

Election headquarters in the courthouse were swamped yesterday and today with last minute aspirants for office filing declarations of candidacies to beat the deadline at midnight tonight.

Practically all the candidates for major offices had filed by last night, but scores of persons running for lesser offices, including precinct committeemen and convention delegates crowded the headquarters.

Although some attorneys contend delegate candidates have another ten days in which to file, County Clerk Glenn B. Ralston announced that tonight will be the deadline for delegates to file.

Mr. Ralston announced today that the county board of election commissioners will receive bids April 11 for printing primary ballots.

Separate bids will be received on the county and city ballots. Because of the great number of candidates, the county ballot will be approximately 19x34 inches, the city ballots being about 9x20 inches.

The board will order 161,524 Democratic county ballots and 146,320 Republican ballots. A total of 138,357 Democratic city ballots and 127,150 Republican ballots will be printed.

### Ross Enters Race

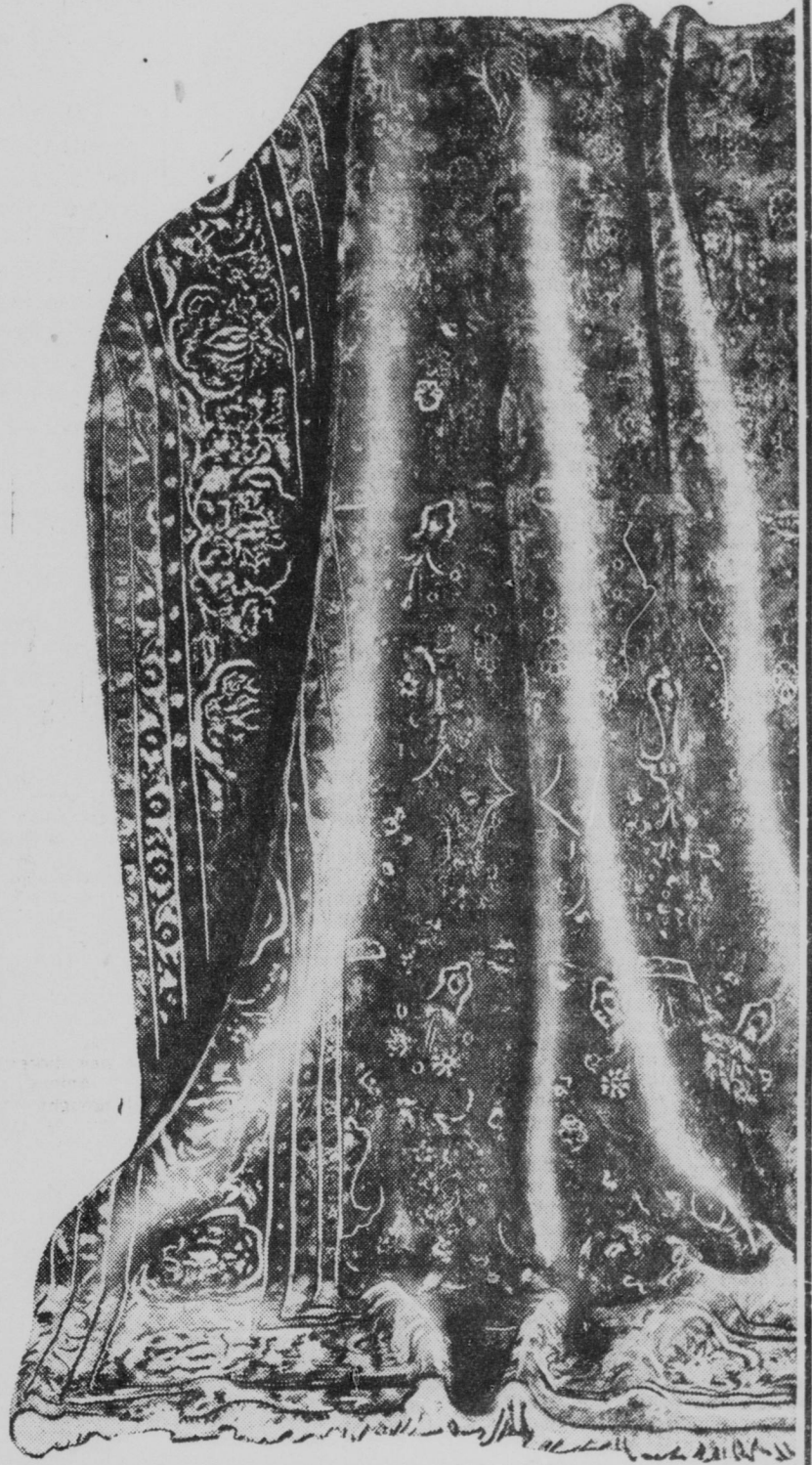
