

Q—Do the Chinese have a day that corresponds to our Sunday?
 A—They have many holy days, but no Sabbath or weekly day of rest. The Mohammedans, Jews and Christians in China observe a Sabbath day.

Q—Has the number of suicides in the United States increased in the last few years?
 A—In 1930 there were 18,496, in 1931 there were 20,030 and in 1932 there were 20,880.

Q—Where was the first railroad tunnel in the United States?
 A—It was built near Johnstown, Pa., by the Allegheny Portage railroad.

Q—How many independent monarchies are there in the world and which continent has the greatest number?
 A—There are now twenty independent monarchies: Eleven in Europe, six in Asia, two in Africa and one in Asia Minor.

Q—How did Hell Gate bridge in New York get its name?
 A—From a narrow pass named "Hell Gate" in East river, which it spans. The name is derived from a Dutch word "hellgate," the translation of which is "bright strait," or "clear opening." The meaning in English was considered appropriate on account of whirlpools which

made navigation at that point dangerous.

Q—Give the area of Oklahoma City.
 A—11,285.4 acres.

Q—Who was Buffalo Child Long Lance?
 A—A full-blooded Blackfoot Indian from southern Alberta. He attended Carlisle (Pa.) Indian school; toured this country with Buffalo Bill, and served in the World war with the Canadian expeditionary force. After the war he took up newspaper work and learned to fly, and also made a picture in Hollywood. On March 21, 1932, he was found shot to death in the Los Angeles house of Anita Baldwin, the wealthy daughter of the late "Lucy" Baldwin, mining magnate. The coroner pronounced it suicide.

 A—41,806,000 (1933 estimate).

Q—Which is correct, "I am five feet tall" or "I am five foot tall"?
 A—The former is correct.

Q—Does freezing impair the food value of milk?




