

BUTLER READY FOR MAY DAY FETE SATURDAY

Students Will Take Part in
Pageant; Queen to Be
Crowned.

Butler university students, faculty, alumni and friends will assemble on the Fairview campus Saturday for the annual May day celebration.

An elaborate program has been prepared for the event, which will open at 9:30 a. m. with a series of college forums for 300 central Indiana high school graduates, who will be special May day guests, and close with a dance from 9 until 12 p. m. in the Lincoln.

Mary Sterrett, senior, will reign as May Queen at the pageant, which will be held at 2:30 p. m. in the wooded section of the campus. The pageant will include scenes from Shakespeare's "Midsummer Night's Dream" and Elizabethan tapestry and the coronation incident to the crowning of the May Queen.

Man de Schippe will take the part of Queen Elizabeth in the tableau. Other members of the cast will be John Thompson, court jester; Lucille Morrison, Dorothy Thompson, Dorothy Aldas and Mary Margaret Ruddle. Two students from the Arthur Jordan Conservatory of Music, Frederick Greve and Robert Emhardt, and the following mem-

The program for high school graduates in the morning will include talks by Mrs. Alice Bidwell Wessenberg, Professor George A. Schumacher and Professor George F. Leonard, on problems confronting the college freshman; an inspection of the Butler campus, a luncheon and musical numbers and entertainment by the Arthur Jordan Conservatory of Music. The high school section of the May day program is being arranged by Evan Walker, assistant to the president.

A May Feast will follow the pageant. It will be served in the formal gardens north of Arthur Jordan memorial hall at 4 p. m. by several co-eds. The dance in the evening will close the program. Miss Kathryn Journey, of the university faculty, is general chairman of May day. Miss Grace Shelton is dance chairman and Miss Frances Beik is coaching the drama.

FUNDS PROVIDED FOR CITY'S NEW LIGHT CONTRACT

Council Passes Resolution
to Employ Experts to
Study Situation.

Funds for the city to employ experts to draw up a new electric light and power contract were provided in a resolution passed under suspension of the rules last night by the city council.

The resolution points out that the works board must advertise for bids for a new contract at least one year before the expiration of the present agreement. The present contract expires in May, 1935.

With the appropriation of \$250 from the mayor's contingency fund, experts will start working on details of a new contract for the city.

Mayor Reginald H. Sullivan recently conferred with officials of the engineering school at Purdue university in regard to a new contract and will collaborate with them in the future on an agreement for the city.

Further steps toward obtaining a new park for west end residents were taken with the passing of an ordinance authorizing the park board to trade a twenty-five-acre strip on Grande avenue near Tenth street for a seventeen-acre lot.
