

## OFFICE SEEKERS FILE CAMPAIGN COST RECORDS

Seventh of June Is Deadline for Election Expense Accounting.

Expense accounts of candidates in the recent primary elections continued to be filed yesterday with Glenn B. Ralston, county clerk, as the deadline of June 7 drew nearer.

Oscar F. Smith, unsuccessful candidate for the Republican nomination for probate court judge spent \$404.20; Vinson H. Mainland, Republican, for juvenile judge, \$260.27; Thomas D. McGee, Democrat, for probate judge, \$331.30.

Democratic state representative candidates were those of Charles Lutz, \$50; Fred C. Barrett, \$22.50; Michael L. Urdal, \$39.00, and Edward P. Barry, \$54.

Other Republicans who filed accounts were Joseph Millner, superior court, \$50.60; William D. Bain, superior court, two, \$236.44; Frank E. Ott, Second district county commissioner, \$21; Duane J. Bellinger, state representative, \$132.50; and Charles M. Clark, joint representative from Marion and Johnson counties, \$53.

## INDIANA SYNOD OF LUTHERANS IS UNDER WAY

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The Indiana synod of the United Lutheran church met today in St. Mark's church here with 300 ministers and laymen registered for its sessions.

The meeting marked reception into the synod of thirty-three congregations formerly in the Southern Michigan group and the transfer of thirteen congregations south of the Ohio river into the new Kentucky synod.

The Rev. H. E. Turney, Columbus, vice-president of the Indiana synod, is presiding at the sessions, which are to continue through Thursday. The Rev. J. Clarence Wall, Evansville, president of the synod, died recently.

The convention was preceded last night by a meeting of the Brotherhood of the Indiana synod, at which Victor L. Schneider, Indianapolis, was chosen as president. Approximately 400, including representa-

tives from Tennessee, Kentucky and Indiana, attended.

Other officers chosen were F. J. Nismer, Ft. Wayne, vice-president; Jesse Hurd, Elwood, secretary, and E. F. C. Weber, Indianapolis, treasurer. Dr. W. W. Wiant, pastor of the North Methodist Episcopal church, addressed the brotherhood on "Builders of a New Age."

Resolutions urging Lutheran ministers to exchange pulpits during October and to deliver sermons on the objectives of the brotherhood were adopted.

## DEAN TRIAL TO BEGIN MONDAY

Jury Will Hear Case of Alleged Slayer Before Judge Baker.

Trial of Edward (Foggy) Dean, alleged trigger man in the machine gun slaying of Police Sergeant Lester Jones a year ago, will begin Monday in Marion criminal court when he faces a first degree murder charge.

Dean's trial date had been set for June 11, but because the trial of

William H. Mason, another alleged member of the bandit gang charged with the slaying of the Indianapolis policeman, was postponed indefinitely in the Hamilton circuit court at Noblesville yesterday, the new trial date was set for Dean.

Prosecutor Herbert E. Wilson and Floyd J. Mattice, chief deputy prosecutor, will have charge of the state's case.

Dean will be tried before a jury and a special venire of seventy-five talesmen will be drawn tomorrow. Criminal Judge Frank P. Baker said.
