EDITORS INVITE ROOSEVELT TO ATTEND OUTING

Democratic Journalists Bid President to Parley at French Lick.

Democratic editors may hear President Franklin D. Roosevelt at the annual midsummer outing of the Indiana Democratic Editorial Association to be held at the French Lick Springs hotel in August. Omer Jackson, state chairman, has been chosen to go to Washington and tender the invitation to the President and, to suit his convenience, the outing will be held either Friday or Saturday, Aug. 3 and 4, or one week later. If the President can not speak at the Saturday night banquet, Frank Finney, association president, said, there are several outstanding Democrats from whom a selection will be made. They include Senator Pat Harrison, Mississippi; Cordell Hull, secretary of state, or Senator Alben W. Barkley, Kentucky. Other speakers at the Saturday night banquet will be Governor Paul V. McNutt, Senator Frederick Van Nuys, chairman Jackson and the Democratic nominee for the United States senate. Mr. Finney appointed Lew O'Bannon, Corydon; Paul Feltus, Bloomington; and Keith L. Johns, secretary of the Democratic state committee, as a committee to prepare resolutions for adoption by the editors.

PAVING BIDS SOUGHT  
Board Opens Proposals June 12 on Work Estimated at \$455,800.  
Bids on an estimated \$455,800 worth of paving, grading and resurfacing of state highways and improvement of city streets which are part of federal-aid highway routes in Vincennes and Ft. Wayne, will be opened June 12 by the state highway commission. The highway work includes projects in eleven counties. Bids on thirteen bridge structures having an estimated cost of \$223,000 also will be opened June 12, according to James D. Adams, highway commission chairman.

KOKOMO, May 28.—The Johnson apartment building, oldest structure of its kind in Kokomo, has been sold by the James D. Johnson estate to Dr. Ralph E. McIndoo. The building was erected by James D. Johnson thirty-five years ago. He died ten years later, but the building had remained in possession of his estate. Brick, nearly white in color, made from glass factory sand, as used in construction of the apartment building. The brick making was a venture which did not prove successful, as most of the glass sand product was too soft for construction purposes.
