

TAX REVISION IS STUDIED BY U. S. LEADERS

Modernizing of Revenue
Laws Is Contemplated
by Administration.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—The administration has under contemplation a "new deal" revision of the revenue laws, including co-ordination of federal and state taxation systems, it was learned today.

The subject is being studied along several lines, with the aim of modernizing the nation's tax structure. Three major purposes are involved:

1. Abolition of the present inefficient overlapping of state and federal revenue sources.
2. Revenue increases without drastic revision of the present rate structure.
3. Strengthening of collection methods, possibly along the line of the British system.

FARMERS OPEN WAR AGAINST CHINCH BUGS

Billions in Grain Already
Lost; U. S. Supplies
Chemicals.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 13.—Science and 5,000,000 farmers are going to war over a 1,500 mile front with a "cross between a bed bug and a fly."

The enemy is the chinch bug, omnivorous terror of corn, oats, wheat, and barley. Its invading armies already have cost an estimated billion dollars this year—more than the Mississippi floods of 1928 or the Chicago fire.

Thousands of acres of devastated farm lands in Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota, the Dakotas and far to the west were being criss-crossed today with chemical barriers against the marching legions of bugs.

A hundred carloads of odorless creosote—ammunition—rolled into

the area as the contribution of the federal government.

The bugs swarming over the entire middle and north west this year are adults which hibernated in clumps of vegetation and along unplanted hedgerows through the winter. They are being re-enforced this month by billions of hungry offspring.

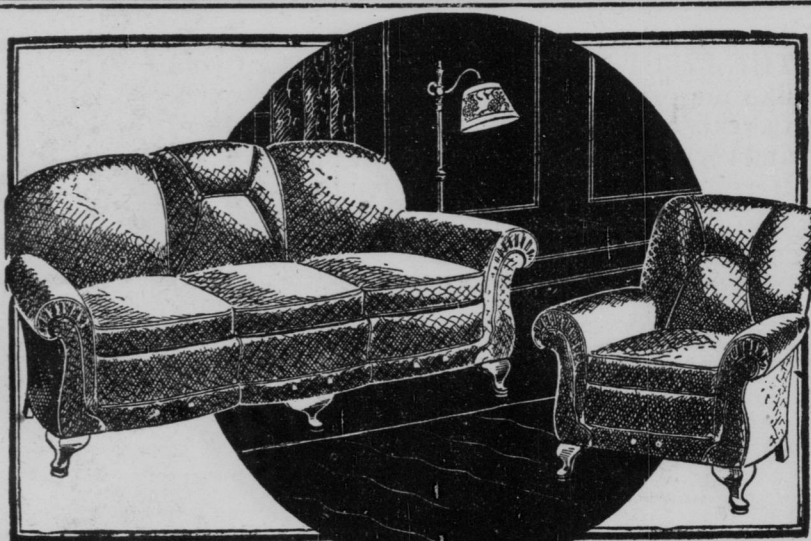
