At the wallpaper store they tore the doors from two safes, one of which containing records, had its combination plainly shown on a tag attached to the knob on the lock. The papers were strewn all over the office.

The second safe yielded \$500 in cash and some checks, the exact amount of which could not be determined at once. Watches and other personal jewelry in the second safe were untouched.

Outstanding skill in model aircraft building was demonstrated by


Indianapolis boys in the National Aeronautical Association contest in Akron, O., last week when they garnered two first places and two runner-up prizes.
