So far, 43,340 boys and girls have attended the playgrounds. This time last year, only 26,922 had deserted back yard for the parks and public playgrounds.

Brookside park was the leader in attendance figures at this time a year ago, but this year Brightwood has leaped ahead of all city playgrounds with 3,848 individual attendance so far.

## FORTUNE FLAYS HIGH TAX RATE

One-Fifth of U. S. Income Goes to Taxes, City Man Claims.

WASHINGTON, July 4.—One-fifth of the national income will be

taken by local, state and national governments in taxation this year, it was charged today in a report to the United States Chamber of Commerce by William Fortune, Indiana's capitalist.

"Total taxes in 1934—federal, state and local—will be approximately \$9,000,000,000," said Mr. Fortune, a member of the chamber's state and local taxation committee.

"If our national income, which was estimated at \$39,000,000,000 for 1933, should reach \$45,000,000,000 this year taxes will take 20 per cent. In most years of the decade prior to the depression, taxes took

no more than 10 to 11 per cent of the national income."

"Even with \$9,000,000,000, budgets will not be balanced and debts will be increased by the governmental units," Mr. Fortune declared.

"We need a policy of realism with respect to curtailment of governmental expenditures, as well as with respect to the proportion of the national income which may be taken for governmental purposes," he concluded.

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
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
