

WILD RUMORS
PROVED FALSE
IN NAZI REVOLT

Expert Coverage Enables
United Press to Keep
Stories Correct.

Now that the violence and much of the excitement over the storm troop revolt in Germany has died down, foreign correspondents here are reviewing the welter of false reports which marked the stormy days beginning last Saturday. The foreign press was flooded with wild rumors of events that did not happen. Edward Beattie, American-trained newspaperman, who was "on the desk" in the Berlin office of the United Press during the revolt, clarifies in the following story many disputed points.

BERLIN, July 6.—Inaccurate reports of happenings in Germany reached a new high during the suppression of the Roehm revolt.

In the absence of trustworthy news sources at the peak of the excitement last week-end, rumors spread rapidly by word of mouth. Many of these reached the outside world under the guise of authoritative news dispatches.

The United Press staff in Berlin was deluged with rumors. Many of them came in the form of cables from New York telling of headlines that were appearing over German stories printed in the United States.

In the interests of clarifying actual developments in the last five days, here are a few of the "big stories" published abroad that the United Press did not carry because they were rumors, which upon investigation, were found to be untrue.

Roehm Report Erroneous
That the number of persons executed would run into hundreds, supplemented later by "evidences" accounts of the execution of sixty storm troopers at one cadet school in Berlin.

(The latest official figure yesterday placed the total deaths in all Germany at forty-six.)

That Ernst Roehm, chief of staff of the Storm Troopers, had committed suicide at Munich on Saturday. (Roehm was executed by a firing squad at 5 p. m. on Sunday.)

That President Paul von Hindenburg disapproved of Hitler's action in having revolt leaders shot. (At the moment this was appearing in print in the United States, the United Press was carrying the text of telegrams which Hindenburg sent to Hitler congratulating him on his course.)

Death Reports False

That artillery fire was heard at Munich. (This was quickly disproved by the United Press correspondent at Munich.)

Among those erroneously reported dead from time to time were President von Hindenburg, August Wilhelm, former crown prince; Chancellor Hitler, President Heindorf of the Potsdam police, and Dr.

FIRE STATION BUILT

FAITH RETAINED
BY ROSENDAHL
IN DIRIGIBLES

Tragedy of Ill-Fated Akron
Fails to Shake Former
Commander.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—Though the dirigible Akron, once the pride of the navy, has lain under eighty feet of ocean water, off Barnegat Light, N. J., more than a year her former skipper's faith in lighter-than-air craft is unshaken. With excitement subsided, Lieutenant Commander C. E. Rosendahl, who formerly captained the Akron, today deliberately outlined what he believed were causes of the crash, then wrote:

"I believe that each of the problems thereby demonstrated is capable of practical solution for the safe and efficient operation of airships in the future."

Recording his deductions in the navy's official organ, United States Naval Institute Proceedings, Commander Rosendahl reported that "a combination of factors" destroyed the Akron.

"I do not consider that the Akron was abruptly hurled out of the sky, sucked down by aerial quicksands," wrote Mr. Rosendahl. "She was not torn to pieces by the elements; not wrecked by the weather; not violently forced into the sea."

"It was a combination of factors that destroyed her. They included a lack of sufficient weather information relative to the formation, travel and intensity of the 'secondary low' into which the ship traveled, inability to learn direction and velocity where she was flying; downward air currents to moderate proportions in the turbulent zone; a deceiving altimeter; temporary changes of buoyancy in warmer and

colder air masses; together with turbulence making it difficult to follow such 'bumps' quickly enough to keep the ship out of steel inclinations; immersion and collapse of the tail in water.

"All led to the retardation of the forward motion of the ship and the inevitable spending of a momentum of a 200-ton mass moving over 100 miles per hour against an unyielding surface. Such was the untimely end of the Akron."
