

INVENTOR, 80, DIES IN CITY; RITES ARE SET

Pioneer Electrician Held Degrees From Three Universities.

Funeral services for Gustave A. Scheffer, 80, of 1001 East Fall Creek boulevard, will be held at the Moore & Kirk funeral home, 3447 College avenue, at 2 today. Burial will be at Crown Hill.

Mr. Scheffer, who died Sunday, was born in Evansville. He held degrees from Notre Dame university, Evansville college and Berlin university, Berlin, Germany.

He was the inventor of one of the first electrical meters and for years had represented the Sewickley Electric Manufacturing Company of Sewickley, Pa., in Indianapolis.

He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. James P. Bailey, with whom he lived, and a brother and sister, Otto Scheffer and Mrs. Fred Hubbard, both of Brooklyn, N. Y.

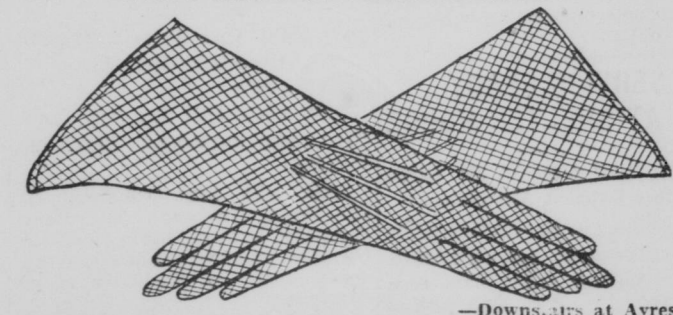
