

## ROOSEVELT OFF ON 3,000-MILE RUN TO HAWAII

Start Is Made in Rain;  
Representatives Handle  
Strike Cares.

ABOARD U. S. S. NEW ORLEANS, July 18.—President Roosevelt, in the cruiser Houston, headed today for Napoosoo, Hawaii, leaving his representatives in the United States to take care of the San Francisco general strike.

In rainy weather, the President left Clipperton island late yesterday for the 3,000-mile run to Napoosoo. His schedule calls for arrival there July 24, with a day of fishing off Honolulu July 26.

For several hours the Houston and its escorting cruiser New Orleans lay at anchor off the two-mile atoll that is Clipperton island. Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., Captain Wilson Brown and Gus Gennerich, secret service man, went fishing. For the first time during his vacation cruise when he had the chance to fish, the President remained aboard the Houston.

No word came from Mr. Roosevelt regarding the strike. He has maintained silence all week. He was up early to watch the cruisers approach the little island—the last land before the Hawaiian Islands.

to Ask Decree.

LOS ANGELES, July 18.—Senator William Gibbs McAdoo's interest in public affairs today had led to a decree of divorce for Mrs. Eleanor Randolph Wilson McAdoo, daughter of the late President Woodrow Wilson. They married May 7, 1914, in the White House.

Under California law, Mrs. McAdoo may apply within one year for a final decree. Mrs. McAdoo charged cruelty; said in brief testimony from the witness stand yesterday that the senator's "lasts and differences" have become so different from her own they have become incompatible.

## TOWNSEND HAS FREE RENT ON FAIR PROPERTY

\$6,000-a-Year Official Lives  
in Red Cross Building  
With Son.

Lieutenant-Governor M. Clifford Townsend, who is Indiana's first full-time Lieutenant-Governor and who draws \$6,000 a year for the job, occupies rent-free quarters at the state fairground, it was learned today.

He and his son Max, who is employed by the Indiana Farm Bureau, live in two rooms in the Red Cross building, which houses persons employed at the fairgrounds. They do not do any cooking in their bachelor quarters there and continue to eat their meals downtown.

The Lieutenant-Governor fled the heat of a downtown hotel room several weeks ago. He explains his present occupancy of the fairground rent-free quarters by saying that he wants to be on the grounds to supervise personally some improvements now under construction.

Mr. Townsend's quarters, according to his own description, are equipped with a bed which he bought secondhand and bed clothing brought from his home near Marion. A living room is furnished

In addition to his duties as Lieutenant-Governor, Mr. Townsend is head of the state department of agriculture, and has supervision of the fairgrounds. Where heretofore, the Lieutenant-Governor's duties have consisted of presiding over the senate during sessions of the legislature, Governor Paul V. McNutt's reorganization bill gave the office added powers.
