MINNEAPOLIS, July 20.—Movement of trucks under heavily armed convoys of police and preparations for a meeting of 25,000 union members gave an ominous turn today to the four-day-old strike of 6,000 truck drivers.

Union leaders accused Police Chief Michael Johannes of abetting truck operators in "provocative moves" and renewed threats of a general strike.
