Mother Seeks Guardianship of \$4,000,000 Heiress.

NEW YORK, July 25.—Court litigation that resembled a social registry opened today. Three of America's most famed families participated in a fight for guardianship of little Gloria Vanderbilt, heiress to \$4,000,000.

It involves the child's mother, Gloria Morgan Vanderbilt, who was but 20 years old when her daughter was placed under the care of George W. Wickesham, former attorney-general. Her petition stated that she now is 29 and capable of protecting her daughter's interests.

Nathan Burke, counsel for Mrs. Vanderbilt, anticipated opposition from two formidable sources, Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, the former Gertrude Vanderbilt, who is the child's aunt, and Mrs. Laura Kilpatrick Morgan, the girl's maternal grandmother.
