DROUGHT TOLL MOUNTS; RAIN STILL MISSING

Return of Terrific Heat Is
Feared in Southwest;
Mercury High.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 3.—The tremendous toll in crops and livestock of the great southwest drought continued to mount today as the section feared repetition today of temperatures that resulted in a terrific casualty list until lowered last week by light showers and breezes from out of the north.

There was no indication in even the most optimistic quarters of a drenching rain in the offing to break the drought. It has been estimated at least ten inches would be needed to restore the soil to normal. Kansas City registered 103 yesterday, and Oklahoma City, 102. Dallas, Tex., had 93; Lincoln, Neb., 94; Omaha, Neb., 92; Chicago, 96 late in the afternoon; St. Louis, 100, and Columbia, Mo., 103.

The forecast today was for fair and not quite so warm weather for Missouri, Nebraska and Kansas. Oklahoma was scheduled for partly cloudy and cooler weather, but not even light showers were forecast for the four states.

DESPERADO TRAPPED. BETRAYED BY WOMAN

Kansas Prison Fugitive Back After
Seven Months Liberty.

LANING, Kan., Aug. 3.—Jim Clark, desperado of the first degree at 30, was back in a cell in the Kansas penitentiary here today after little more than six months freedom.

Clark headed seven other desperate convicts over the wall Jan. 19. He was taken yesterday in an apartment in Tulsa, Okla. Clark's recapture was credited to Earl Silverton, University of Kansas graduate and member of the Kansas highway patrol. Silverton traced Clark through women friends; was introduced to him last Tuesday by the outlaw's sweetheart and successfully laid a trap for Clark in the apartment where he was captured.

NAVY BALLOON LIKELY WINNER IN TITLE RACE

Officials Check Distances
After Five Contenders
End Trip.

BIRMINGHAM Ala., Aug. 3.—Although official results of the national balloon race will not be known until barographs of each contestant can be checked and geodetic surveys of distances made, it appeared certain today that the navy's entry had won.

The Navy, piloted by Lieutenant Charles Kendall and Lieutenant H. T. Orville, was the last to land after the ascension here last Tuesday night. It came to earth at Commerce, Ga., about 200 miles airline distance from Birmingham, where the race started Tuesday night.

Unfavorable, slow air currents shortened the race, according to the balloonists.

The privilege of representing the United States in the Gordon Bennett international balloon race at Warsaw, Poland, on Sept. 23, appeared to have been won by the navy craft, the army entry No. 1 and the entry sponsored by the Buffalo Courier-Express.

Army No. 1 landed near Monticello, Ga., after covering 180 miles. The Buffalo newspaper entry came down at Mansfield, Ga., 170 miles from the starting point.

Fourth place likely was won by the army No. 2 bag, which landed near Covington, Ga., about 165 miles from Birmingham.

Winners of the first four places will share \$1,750 in prize money. The famous Goodyear VIII, the fifth craft, was forced down because of escaping gas near the city limits of Atlanta, 133 miles from here.
