

MISSION DRIVES TO OBTAIN 100 BEDS FOR SICK

Headquarters Established in City for Tubercular Campaign.

Headquarters for the Flower Mission Tubercular hospital campaign have been established at 712 Chamber of Commerce building to push the drive for additional funds for a new 100-bed tubercular unit at city hospital.

The society has received a grant of \$38,500 from the public works administration for the construction of the unit. Formal application for the grant will be made Friday by Mayor Reginald L. Sullivan and the health board.

The definite amount of additional funds which must be raised will be decided at this meeting.

Mrs. James D. Ermston is chairman of the society's hospital committee. Other members are Mrs. James H. Lowes, Mrs. Edward Perger, Mrs. W. C. Smith and Mrs. David Ross, society president.

The Flower Mission has played an outstanding role in philanthropic and public health movements here for fifty-eight years, turning most of its activities over to other agencies after having seen that they were well started.

RICH RANCHER IS TERRORIZED BY KIDNAPERS

Wealthy Coast Man Taken to Hotel, Threatened; Found Unharmed.

PALM SPRINGS, Cal., Aug. 10.—Terrorized by two men, who abducted him from a Los Angeles hotel and told him not "to show your head before 5 o'clock this morning," J. C. Kubie, 40, wealthy citrus rancher of Edon, was found in a fashionable hotel early today.

The rancher was rescued by Riverside county deputy sheriffs, who are seeking Mr. Kubie's two abductors, one of whom he described as being 25 years old, short and black-haired. Mr. Kubie said he never saw the other.

Deputies from Indio, Cal., informed that Mr. Kubie was in the hotel room, raided it and found Mr. Kubie sitting in darkness with the doors and windows tightly barred. He nearly was overcome from fright and heat.

According to Mr. Kubie, he was accosted on a Los Angeles street yesterday and menaced with a gun.

He was given certain definite orders regarding his actions during subsequent hours, and later was again accosted by two men, this time in his hotel room, he said.

The pair forced him to go to Palm Springs, where he was told to remain in hiding until 5 o'clock today. Meantime, Indio deputies were mysteriously informed of Mr. Kubie's plight and went to his rescue.

Police in Los Angeles went through Mr. Kubie's room after he was reported missing and found a brief note scrawled on a poster. It read: "I am not back at 6 a. m. Thursday report to police."

Officers were reluctant to reveal the motive for the plot, but insisted ransom was not involved.

"It apparently was a plot to intimidate Mr. Kubie regarding certain business transactions," Deputy Sheriff Ben De Crezocogur of Indio said. "We don't want to reveal too much. Mr. Kubie was not injured, but he was in a condition bordering on hysteria."
