

Students Will Work

GREENCASTLE, Sept. 5.—A cooperative house plan to reduce living costs of students, originated at Indiana university two years ago,

will be inaugurated at De Pauw university when the fall term opens Sept. 10.

The play, worked out by Mrs. Ethel Bell when she was educational director of the Union county farm bureau, permits students with only a small amount of cash to use canned goods, meats, vegetables and other farm products as part payment of their living costs.

Although especially adapted to 4-H club members, the plan is open to other students who can qualify, Mrs. Bell said.

The house at De Pauw will be in charge of Mrs. Bell's daughter, Miss Irene Mikesell and will have a house mother also in attendance. It will accommodate twenty men students.

Those living in the house will pay \$15 a month, approximately half the average living cost for De Pauw students, and each will contribute about 10 quarts of canned foods to the commissary from which will be drawn supplies for meals served at the house.

Students will do all the work, requiring about an hour a day from each.
