

LINDBERGH RANSOM LETTERS REVEALED, STRESS BABY'S GOOD HEALTH AND SAFETY

Copies of Notes Released by Police Trace
Tragic Events Through Jafsie's
Delivery of Money.

TRENTON, N. J., Sept. 25.—Colonel H. Norman Schwarzkopf, superintendent of the New Jersey state police, today made public copies of the ransom notes received by Charles A. Lindbergh and others.

The text follows:
Number one: (Left on window sill of baby's nursery, Ed.)
"Dear Sir:
"Have 500000 redy 250000 in 20\$ bills 15000 in 10\$ bills and 10000 in 5\$ bills. After 2-4 days we will inform you were to deliver the money.
"We warn you for making any thing public or for notify the police.
"The child is in gude care.
"Identification for our letters are signature."

FED ACCORDING TO DIET

Number two: (mailed).
"Dear Sir—We have warned you not to make anything public; so notify the police now you have to take the consequences. Means we will hold the baby until everything is quiet. We can not make any appointment just now. We know very well what it means to us. It is rely necessary to make a world affair out of this or to get your baby back as soon as possible to settle those affair in a quick way will be better for both—don't be afraid about the baby—keep keeping care of us day and night. We also will feed him according to the diet. (Mrs. Lindbergh had given the newspapers the baby's diet appealing to the kidnapers to follow it.—Editor).
"We are interested to send him back in gut health. And ransom was made aus for 500000, but now we have to take another person to it and probably have to keep the baby for a longer time as we expected.
"So the amount will be by 70000, 20000 in 50\$ 25000 in 20\$ bills 15000 in 10\$ bills and 10000 in 5\$ bills. Don't mark any bills or take them from one serial nomer. We will form you latter where to deliver the money. But will note do so until the police is out of the case and the ap and the papers are quiet.
"The kidnaping we prepared in, so we are prepared for anything."

RANSOM IS INCREASED

Number Three: (Mailed to Colonel Lindbergh, in care of Colonel Breckinridge's New York office.)
"Dear Sir. Did you receive our letter from mark 4. We sent the A mail in one off the latter—near Boro Hall, Brooklyn we know police interfere with your private mail. How can we come to any arrangements this way. In the future we will send our letter to Mr. Breckinridge at 25 Broadway. We believe police captured two letter and let not forward to you. We will not accept any go-between from your sent. We will arrange these latter. There is no worry about the boy. He is very well and will be feed according to the eit. Best dank for information about it. We are interested to send your boy back in gut health.
"It is necissary to make a world affair out of it, or to get your boy back as soon as possible. Why did you ignore our letter which we left in the room the baby would be back long ago. You would not get any result from police because our kidnaping was planed for a year allredy. But we were afraid the boy would no strong enough.
"Our ransom las made oit for 500000 oit now we have to put another—to it as properly have to hold the baby longer as we expected so it will be 700000.
"20000 50\$ bills 25000 in 20\$ bills 1500 in 10\$ bills and 10000 in 5\$ bills. We warn you again not to mark any bills or take them from one ser No. we will inform you latter how to deliver the money, but not before the police is out of this case and the papers are quiet.
"Please put a short notice about this letter in the New-York American."

ASKED TO PREPARE PLANE

Number four: (To Dr. John F. Condon in response to his newspaper advertisement offering to be intermediary. Ed.)
"Dear Sir. Please handel inclosed latter to Colonel Lindbergh it is in Mr. Lindbergh interest not to notify the police."
Number five: (The enclosed letter.)
"Dear Sir. Mr. Condon may act as go between. You may give him the 70000\$ make one packet this size will be about (drawing).
"We have notified you already in what kinds of bills we warn you not to set any trapp in any way. If you or someone else will notify the police there will be a further delay. After we have the money in hand we will tell you where to find you boy.
"You may have a aerplane redy it is about 150 mile away. But before telling you the add. A delay of 8 hours will be between."

"MONEY IS REDY"

Number six: (To Dr. Condon.)
"Dear Sir. If you are willing to act as go-between in Lindbergh case please follow
"Handel inclosed letter personally to Mr. Lindbergh. It will explain everything. Dont tell anyone about it as sure we find out the press or police is notified everything are cansell and it will be a further delay after you gets the money from Mr. Lindbergh put—3 word in the New-York American: "Money is redy"
"After that we will give you further instructions dont be afraid we are not out for your 1000\$ keep it only act strictly. Be at home every night between 6-12 by this time you will hear from us.
"Dr. Condon advertised that the "party" wanted proof that he dealt with the real kidnapers. He asked for a code for further communication. This letter was in reply—Ed.)

"CHILD IN SAFE PLASE"

Number seven:
"Dear Sir. It is note necessary to furnish any code. You and Mr. Lindbergh know our program very well we will keep the child in our save plase until we have the mony in hand but if the deal is note closed until the 8 of April we will ask for 30000 more also note 70000-100000.
"How can Mr. Lindbergh follow so many false clues he knows we are the right party our signature is still the same as in the ransom note, but if Mr. Lindbergh likes to fool around for another month we can help it.
"Once he has to come to us anyway but if he keeps on waiting we will double our amount there is absolute no fear about the child. It is well!"

Number eight: (In response to Dr. Condon's appeal for a rendezvous.—Ed.)
"Mr. Condon. We trust you but we will note come in your haus it is to danger even you can not know if police or secret service is watching you.
"Follow this instruction, take a car and drive to the last supway station from Jerome ave line, (100 feet from the last station on the left seide is a empty frank-further stand with a big open porch around you will find a notice in senter of porch under neath a stone. This notice will tell you were to find us.
"Act accordingly.
"After ¼ of a hour be on the place bring the monny with you."
Number nine: (The note that was under the stone.—Ed.)
"Cross the street and follow the fence from the cemetery to 233 street I will meet you."

BABY'S CLOTHES SENT

Number ten: (The kidnapers apparently expected Dr. Condon to bring the money. Herein he shows disappointment, but agrees to furnish proof. Ed.)
"Dear Sir. Auer man failed to collect the money. There are no more confidential conference after the meeting from March 12. Those arrangements to hazardous for us. We will note allow auer man to confer on a way like before. Circumstances will note allow us to make a transare like you wish. It is impossible for us. Wy should we move the baby and face danger to a take another person to the place is out of the question. It seems you are afraid if we are the right party and F the L you have our signature it is always the same as the first one specially thru 3 holes.
"Now we will send you the sleeping suit from the baby besides it means 3 sending expenses because we have to pay another one. Please tel Mrs. Lindbergh note to worry the baby is well. We only have to give him more food as the lines said.
"You are willing to pay the 70000 note 50000\$ without seeing the baby first or note. Let us know about that in this New York American we cant do it other way. Because we don't like to give up our safty plase or to move the baby. If you are willing to accept this deal put line in paper.
"I accept money is redy
"Our program is.
"After hours we have the money recoid we will notify you where to find the baby. If this is any trapp you will be responsible what will follow"

JAFSIE IS REBUFFED

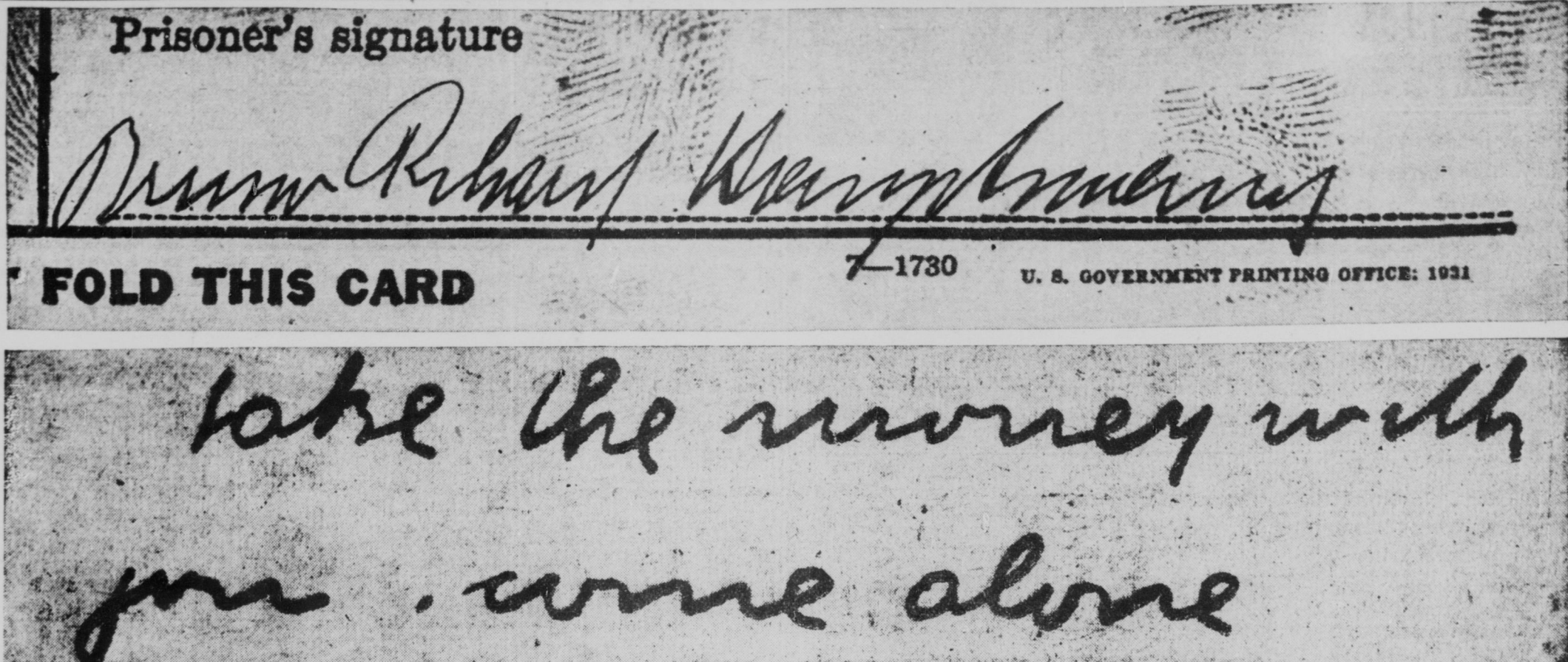
Number eleven: (Dr. Condon acknowledged receipt of sleeping suit, but sought additional proof. He got this rebuff.—Ed.)
"Dear Sir. You and Mr. Lindbergh know our program if you don't accept den we will wait untill you agree with our deal. We know you have come to us anyway. But why should Mrs. and Mr. Lindbergh suffer longer as necessary. We will note communicate with you or Mr. Lindbergh until you write so in the paper.
"We will tell you again, this kidnaping case was prepared for a year already so the police won't have any looks to find us, or the child.
"You only puch everything futher out did you send that little package to Mr. Lindbergh it contains the sleeping suit from the baby. The baby is well."

(Dr. Condon then advertised: "I accept. Money is ready.—Ed.).
Number twelve:
"Dear Sir—Have the money ready by Saturday evening we will inform you where and how to deliver it.
"Have the money in one bundle we want you to put it in a certain place there is no fear that somebody else will take it, we watch everything closely please lett us know if you agree and ready for action by Saturday evening—if yes put in the paper.
"Yes everything O. K.
"It is a very simple delivery, but we find out very soon if there is any trapp after 8 hours you gete the adr from the boy, on the place you find two ladies they are innocence. If it is to late we put it in the New York American for Saturday morning. Put it in the New York Journal"
"Dr. Condon followed instruction.)
The following was delivered by a taxi driver.—Ed.).

MONEY IS DELIVERED

Number thirteen:
"Dear Sir. Take a car and follow Tremont ave to the east untill you reach the number 3225 East Tremont ave.
"It is a nursery
"Bergen
"Greenhouses florist
"There is a table standing outside right on the door. You find a let-

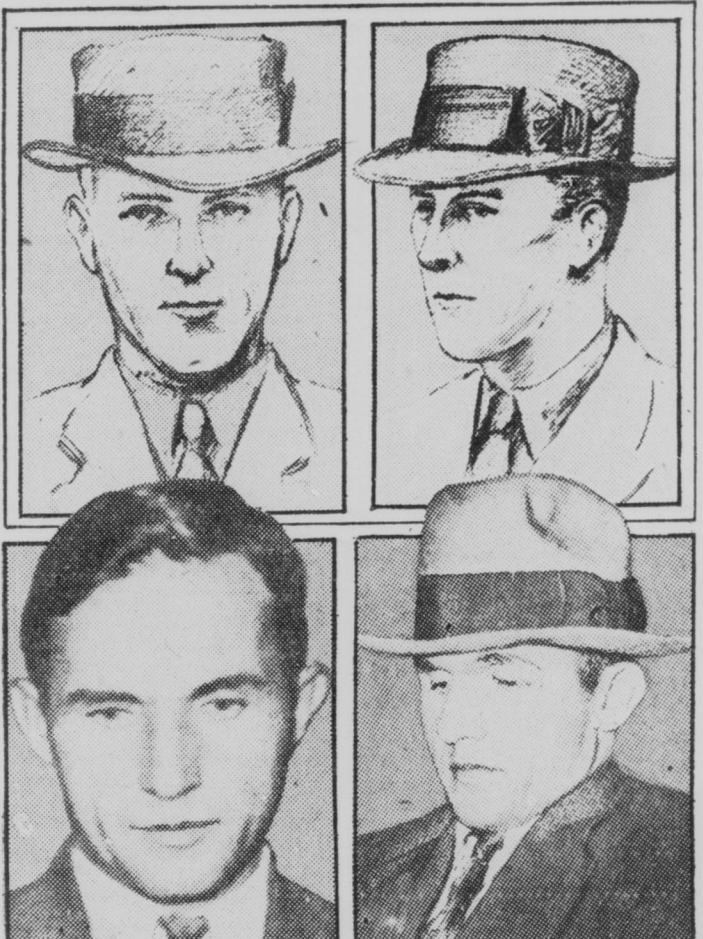

Number fifteen: "John" handed this to Dr. Condon in exchange for the money.—Ed.)
"The boy is on board Nelly it is a small board 28 feet long two person are on the board they are innocent. You will find the board between Horseneck Bogach and Gay Head near Elizabeth island"
A few days later this pathetic advertisement appeared in the classified column:
"Did you cross me?—Jafsie"

One of the most remarkable coincidences of the Lindbergh kidnaping case is the resemblances of Bruno Hauptmann, indicted suspect, to the imaginary kidnaper whose likeness was drawn by a Washington artist for the department of justice from descriptions furnished by Dr. John (Jafsie) Condon and Joseph Perrone, cab driver, the only persons known to have been in touch with the culprits. The artist's sketches and pictures of Hauptmann in similar poses are shown above for comparison.

CRYING BABY MAY MOVE HAUPTMANN

Lindbergh Suspect to Hear
Infant's Wails in Jail.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—The determined efforts of authorities to get a confession of the Lindbergh kidnaping from Bruno R. Hauptmann without resorting to third-degree methods, touched a new mark in police ingenuity today with reports that a "crying baby" would be used as a stage "prop."

One person closely connected with the investigation said it was planned to place a crying baby near Hauptmann's cell in an effort to break down his persistent denials of guilt. It was not clear just how police would get the baby to cry, although a suggestion was made that a phonograph of a baby's wail be used instead of the real thing.

The informant said that the police planned for Hauptmann to hear the wailing frequently, probably all day or longer, presumably on the theory that a guilty person would be reminded of the death of the Lindbergh baby. It also was said that Hauptmann showed the greatest emotion since his arrest when he saw his own 18-months-old son yesterday.

The questioning of Hauptmann has been long, he has gone without sleep and he has been taken over the same ground repeatedly in an effort to break his story, but so far as could be learned there has been no "third degree."

It was said by one patrolman that he went without sleep for about sixty-four hours after his arrest.

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
