

CITY LIGHTING BIDS PROVIDE FOR INCREASE

Cost Raise to Be Offset by
Equipment Transfer
in July, 1945.

City officials are studying street lighting bids submitted yesterday by the Indianapolis Power and Light Company to the works board.

Acceptance of the bid would raise annual cost to the city of its lighting system \$52,000, but would provide that title to all light standards and underground cable would be transferred to the city ten years from July 1, 1935, when the contract would expire light company officials explained.

The 4,214 standards and the cable are worth \$1,000,000, according to Emmett G. Ralston, vice-president and chief engineer of the company. For these the city would pay \$520,000 at the rate of \$52,000 a year for ten years. The standards properly maintained and painted will remain sound over a long period, Mr. Ralston said.

He further pointed out that the present contract between the park board and the power company and the contract which expired ten years ago are similar to the proposal submitted yesterday.

The company also submitted a bid to supply the park department with electricity at an approximate annual price of \$40,000, which is substantially the same amount charged in past years although there may be some slight reduction.

Bids for maintenance of both the park and street lighting systems were submitted by the Weisbach Street Lighting Company of America. They will be analyzed this week by A. H. Moore, city engineer, who will submit a report to the mayor and the works board on the bids of both companies later this week.

Annual charge for street lighting under the present contract is approximately \$319,000. Under the new bid it would amount to about \$377,400, an increase of \$58,000.

Mr. Ralston explained, however, that the extra \$6,000, after the \$52,000 for payment for equipment has been deducted, is offset by a reduction in the rate for miscellaneous lighting, which includes public buildings, traffic lights and similar equipment.

The present rate on miscellaneous lighting is 3 cents a kilowatt hour less 5 per cent. The proposed rate is 2 1/2 cents a kilowatt hour less 3 per cent and was substituted to both the works and park boards.

M'NUTT STUDIES PLAN FOR UNIFYING RELIEF

Governor Paul V. McNutt announced yesterday that he was considering a plan to divide the state into four relief districts and thus co-ordinate relief.

Under the present setup state relief is handled by the Governor's unemployment commission with offices here. Howard Hunter, Washington, federal emergency relief administration field agent, conferred with the Governor and stated that the government was well pleased with the Indiana relief system.

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PRESIDENT BANS PARTY'S TORIES, G. O. P. CLAIMS

Appeal to Liberals Held
Evidence of Hope for
Realignment.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—President Roosevelt appears today to be waving conservative Democrats toward the nearest exit to make room for independent voters and liberals of both parties who have been invited under the New Deal tent.

Republicans complain he is trying to scuttle the Democratic party. Second readings of Mr. Roosevelt's fireside chat caused politicians to study his claim to the allegiance of "all forward-looking men and women." In view of his language, the party realignment movement appears to be proceeding briskly.

The President said the American political and economic system is being rebuilt to New Deal design but emphasized that the work was proceeding in strict accord with American principles and tradition. The political reference evidently was to the two-party system. Discussing gains in trade and industry and development of administration policy, Mr. Roosevelt said:

"There are assurances that hearten all forward looking men and women with the confidence that we are definitely rebuilding our political and economic system on the lines laid down by the New Deal."

The statement, coming six weeks before a general election, emphasizes the existing scrambling of party lines. The Republican senatorial-congressional committee issued today an anthology of Democratic criticism of the New Deal and charged that Mr. Roosevelt was scuttling the Democratic party. The

Republican campaign pamphlet said the President had banned the word "Democrat" from his speeches.

Quoted by the Republicans in bitter protest against various Roosevelt policies were Senator Carter Glass (Dem., Va.); former Governor Alfred E. Smith; John W. Davis, the Democratic presidential nominee in

1924; former Senator James A. Reed of Missouri and several others nationally prominent.
