

YOUNG FATHER, HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENT, DIES

Clinton Smith, 26, Victim;
County Fatalities Now
Stand at 100.

Injuries suffered by Clinton Smith, 26, of 1433 Spann avenue, in an automobile accident Tuesday resulted in his death late yesterday at city hospital.

Mr. Smith is the 100th victim of traffic accidents in Marion county this year.

He was riding in a car driven by his brother, Leonard Smith, 24, which crashed into the Pennsylvania railroad abutment at Sherman drive.

Surviving Mr. Smith are the widow, Ina M. Smith; an infant son, Leonard Smith; his mother, Mrs. Lulu Smith, College Corners, O.; five sisters and the brother.

Struck by an automobile driven by Charles Pierson, 41, of 4261 English avenue, at Washington street and Butler avenue, last night, Miss Ruth Nuss, 26, of 432 West Forty-second street, is in city hospital suffering from fractures of the kneecap and nose.

Mrs. Andrew A. Brown, 65, of 2921 Washington boulevard, received a broken leg last night when she was struck by an automobile as she was crossing Delaware street in the 2800 block. The car was driven by George O. Brown, 34, of 3326 East Thirtieth street. Mrs. Brown was sent to St. Vincent's hospital.

SOCIAL REFORM CONSIDERED BY EPISCOPALIANS

Changes in Divorce Canon,
Marriage Notice Are
Proposed.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 12.—The fifty-first triennial general convention of the Protestant Episcopal church today moved toward consideration of several vital socio-religious problems almost certain to cause controversy.

Among them were proposals for reform of the church's divorce canon and elimination of the three-day notice period for an Episcopal marriage. In addition, there was a resolution protesting discrimination against Negroes by federal relief and employment agencies and a memorial calling on the Episcopal church to obtain for its members who are conscientious objectors the same exemption enjoyed by members of the Society of Friends in time of war.

All these and more were received by the house of deputies, consisting of clergy and lay deputies. A plea for continuance of missionary work was made in an address by the Rt. Rev. Frank Whittington Creighton, suffragan bishop of Long Island and bishop-in-charge of the Episcopal missionary district of Mexico, before a women's auxiliary mass meeting.

BABY, 4 OTHERS HURT IN ATTACKS ON BUSESSES

Violence Breaks Out After 14 Are
Indicted in Daeths.

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—Less than eight hours after fourteen men were indicted yesterday on charges growing out of the deaths of two persons at the hands of bus strike terrorists, a 2-year-old baby and four other

persons were injured in attacks on two coaches.

The child and three women were cut by glass when a man threw a bottle, believed to have contained acid, through a coach window on Garfield avenue.

The county grand jury yesterday returned murder indictments against William Taber and Joseph J. Kehoe, officials of the street car division of a union which includes the striking bus drivers, and twelve other men.
