

STATE PARLEY OF OSTEOPATHS OPENS IN CITY

Election of Officers Held
Group to Hear Noted
Speakers.

The Indiana Osteopathic Association today began its annual convention at the Lincoln, with election of officers and a speech by Dr. Russell C. McCaughan, Chicago, American Osteopathic Association executive secretary, as highlights in the day's schedule.

Dr. C. B. Blakeslee, R. R. 17, Box 188B, was elected president. Other officers chosen were Wesley Warner, Ft. Wayne, vice-president, and Dr. Elizabeth Crain, Richmond, and Dr. Charles M. Eccles, Connersville, trustees. The trustees re-elected Fred L. Swope, Richmond, as secretary, and Dr. Kate Williams, 519 Sutherland avenue, as treasurer.

Dr. Walter S. Grow, 4240 Park avenue, was re-elected delegate to the American Osteopathic Association, and A. D. Caine, Marion, named as his alternate.

Dr. McCaughan, a native of Kokomo, who formerly was active in the state organization, will discuss "State Medicine" at the annual banquet tonight at the Lincoln. The officers were to be elected earlier in the day.

Following the dinner, a technical session will be conducted by members of the Chicago College of Osteopathy faculty, including Dr. E. R. Hoskins, roentgenologist, who will demonstrate reading of full-view X-ray photographs.

Following another scientific session tomorrow, Dr. McCaughan will speak at 1 tomorrow afternoon on "Economic Trend in Practice." Convention visitors will then be conducted on a trip through the Eli Lilly & Co. plant while the osteopaths' wives and families will visit the Scottish Rite Cathedral.






