

CLOSED BANK QUIZ PLEDGED BY HARRISON

Republican Candidate for Prosecutor Promises Probe.

A thorough investigation of all closed banks, with prosecution where fraud was indicated, was promised last night by William Henry Harrison, Republican prosecutor nominee, in a speech at 539 West Washington street.

"As I have gone through the city and county in the last thirty days I have been beset with questions from former depositors in its defunct banks," he said. "They want to know whether there is any hope of ever knowing the facts concerning the failure of these banks."

"The longer the facts are kept from them, the stronger is their conviction that the officials of these banks are guilty. They feel, and rightly so, that they are entitled to know the entire facts without further delay—to the end that the guilty be punished and the innocent be freed from the cloud of suspicion now resting over all those connected with these institutions."

"I have gone on record that, if elected, I will make an immediate and personal investigation of the remaining bank cases and will give the public the information to which they are entitled."

"I also have stated publicly that the prosecutor's office would not be used for political purposes nor would indictments be returned without just cause. I feel that the prosecutor should defend the innocent as well as prosecute the guilty."

"I know nothing of the evidence submitted in these cases nor am I passing on the guilt or innocence of any one connected with them. If, from my investigation, I should find no evidence connecting any individual with unlawful acts, I should take immediate steps to clear that individual's name from further suspicion."

"However, if I should find any evidence of guilt I would see that that party stood trial for such acts."
