

# SCIENCE SCOFFS AT EFFORTS TO RESTORE DEAD

Inability to Revive Mental  
Faculties Is Seen as  
Handicap.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 8.—In spite of repeated efforts and reports of dramatic instances of restoring the apparently dead to life, scientists have not yet found a way to beat death.

They can postpone it for longer or shorter period. They can rekindle the flame of life from what appear to be cold ashes. But most of them agree that they have as yet no way to restore life in a body that is really dead.

Most of them are willing to acknowledge this final defeat, because they realize that success in restoring the mechanical phases of life would still fail to restore that intangible factor that distinguishes a living creature from a robot. The person so revived would, they feel, be restored to a horrible sort of living death.

One of the never-say-die group, a Russian scientist, has just reported a new device intended to beat death. This device is a pump, a sort of artificial heart, designed to restore victims of asphyxia or drowning an hour or more after death.

**Report Is Ridiculed**  
This report belongs "really in the class of perpetual motion machines," according to Dr. Yandell Henderson, professor of applied physiology at Yale university. Asked to comment on the report from Russia, Dr. Henderson, a noted authority in this field of resuscitation, said:

"It has long been known that the heart of a baby that dies at birth can be removed, kept on ice for twenty-four hours, and then perfused and made to beat again.

"The evidence is fairly clear that the heart of an adult might be made to beat after an hour or more of asphyxia. The so-called vegetative centers in the spinal cord, and lower part of the brain, will stand somewhere between ten and fifteen minutes of asphyxia and can then be restored so that the revived victim breathes again.

"But for the higher centers in the brain, which are concerned in consciousness and intellect, it is a well established fact that even as little as five minutes, and certainly a little as ten minutes, always produce such profound injuries that restoration of normal function is impossible.

**Brain Does Not Revive**  
This explains what sometimes happens to a man who has suffered from anoxia, or asphyxia just long enough to destroy the higher centers of the brain and who is revived. He may then live for a considerable time but he is not a normal man.

The method described in the report from Russia would resuscitate the victims of asphyxia as completely effective in restoring not only life but also intellect. The asphyxia must be interrupted as is often the case in cases of monoxide poisoning, or brief as in cases of drowning that are rescued quickly and where measures of resuscitation are immediately applied."

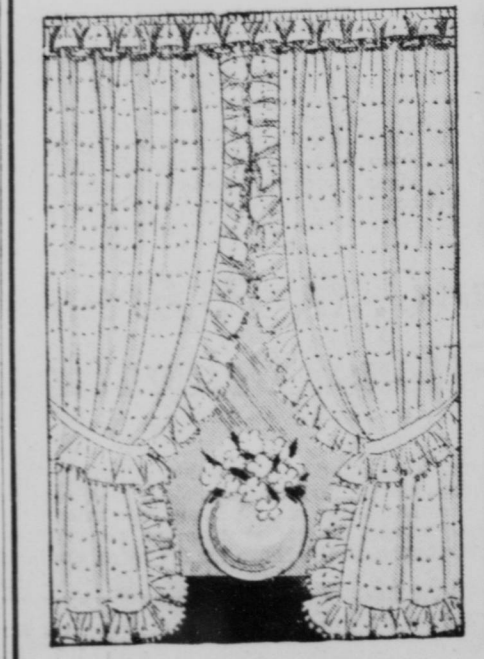

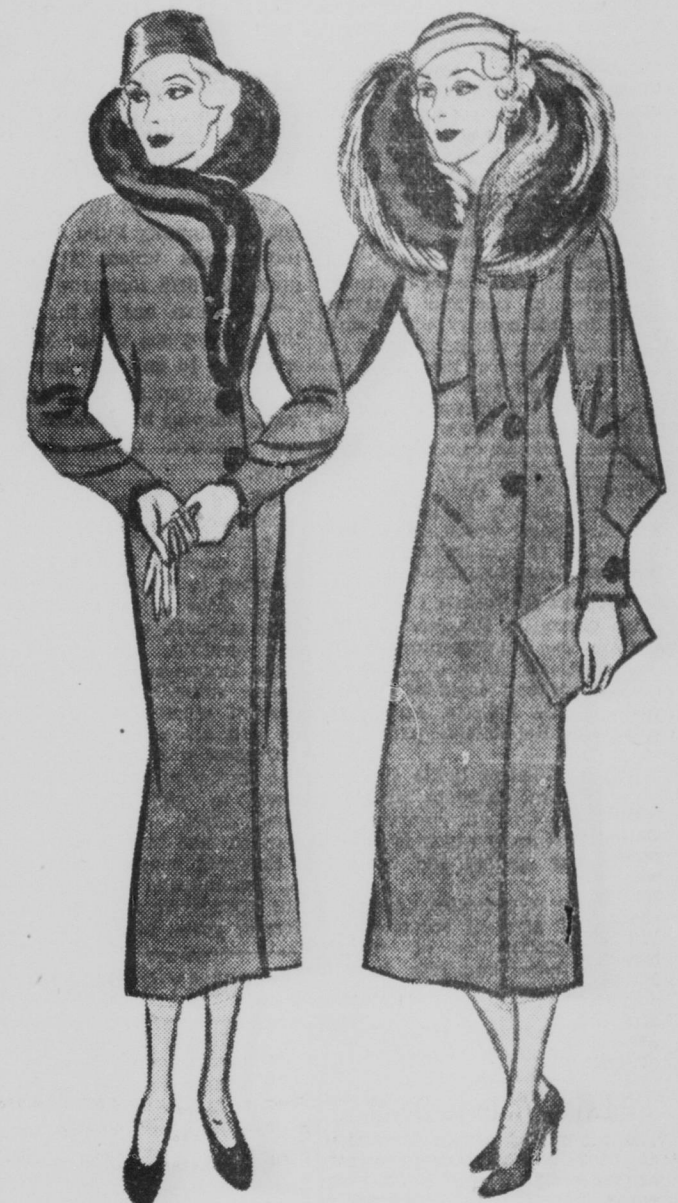
