

SLAYING BARES AMATEUR GANG OF RICH YOUTHS

Judge's Son Killed Wealthy
Student in Underworld
Feud, Police Say.

TULSA, Okla., Dec. 3.—New arrests in the break-up of an alleged gang of amateur criminals formed from adventure-seeking scions of prominent families were promised by police today.

Already held were Phillip Kennamer, 19, son of Federal Judge Franklin E. Kennamer, charged with murdering John Gorrell, 23, son of a prominent physician, and Wade Thomas, owner of a night club patronized by youths of wealthy families, who was charged with being the "brains" of the gang.

Thomas, police said, made a practice of involving young men of prominent families in gambling games. The young men always lost, police charged, and many owed Thomas large sums they could not pay.

Gorrell, police said, was killed because he was suspected of "chasing in" on a kidnap plot directed against H. F. Wilcox, millionaire oil man. His body was found in his motor car last Tuesday night. Young Kennamer surrendered Saturday, saying he killed Gorrell in self-defense.

The elder Kennamer, celebrated for stern sentences meted out, was stunned.

"Gorrell and Kennamer fell out," Holly Anderson county prosecutor, said. "Kennamer killed Gorrell because Gorrell knew too much about his past activities. There was a second motive, jealousy. But not jealousy over a girl. That idea is out."

FRANKLIN, Dec. 3.—Gain of \$17,000 in payment of the fall installment of taxes over the spring installment is reported by George A. Gillispy, Johnson county treasurer, who also collected \$43,000 in delinquent taxes this year.

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HOLIDAY TINSEL IS FIRE HAZARD, CITY CAUTIONED

Warning Is Given by Voshell
and Lynch: Point Out
Many Dangers.

Warning to Indianapolis citizens against the use of inflammable materials in Christmas decorations was given today by Harry E. Voshell, fire chief, and Bernard A. Lynch, fire prevention chief.

Decorative materials should not be arranged in continuous festoons from post to post, as breaks or spaces in between will prevent the spread of fire.

Poles provided with hooks, to be used in pulling down inflammable decorations, are suggested in case of fire.

Package wrappings should be disposed of promptly, and not left lying around. Lighted candles should not be used, nor carelessly wired electric lights, in tree decorations.

Christmas trees should be placed a safe distance from stoves, fire-

places, hot air registers and steam pipes. Metal tinsel trimmings, mica or flake asbestos is suggested as the best artificial snow.

Chief Voshell and Chief Lynch warn against the use of cotton trimming on trees, and the use of cotton for whiskers on Santa Claus costumes.

Danger of certain kinds of toys was pointed out in the warning sent out. These include motion picture projectors using nitrocellulose film, which, when burning gives off fumes that cause death even when only a small quantity is taken into the lungs.

Admonition against the purchase of toys involving the use of alcohol, gasoline or kerosene and low-priced electrical playthings, insecurely wired and firmly constructed, also was given.

In the event of fire, the department advises an immediate call to the fire department.
